DEATH OF PIONEER

WESLEY CURRIE

OLD RESIDENT OF COTTAGE
GROVE EXPIRES—CAME TO OIL
EGON IN 1867

Died, at Cottage Grove, on Sunday,
September 29, 1907, John Wesley
Currie, born May 5, 1842.

Thus passes away another pioneer
and a much beloved resident of our
city. John Wesley Currie was born
in Virginia May 5, 1842. At the age
of ten years his family moved to Mis-
souri, from which state in 1867 he
and his brother crossed the plains
and came to Oregon, settling in Lane
county. In 1872 he returned to Mis-
souri and married Miss Lucy Cun-
ningham on November 5, 1872, and
remained in that state until 1893,
when he again came to Cottage Grove
where he has since resided.

At the early age of twenty he be-
came converted and united with the
Methodist church. He has always
been identified with the interests of
this denomination, and has been
prominent in all things pertaining to
the church and almost continually
held such church offices as class
leader, steward, trustee, etc. He was
a zealous worker and his daily life
testified to his sincerity. He leaves
a wife, one son and two daughters,
and four brothers to mourn his loss.

SAYS HER HUSBAND

DRINKS AND IS CRUEL

JUNCTION CITY PEOPLE IN THE
DIVORCE COURT—PLAINTIFF
ASKS FOR ALIMONY AND CUS-
TODY OF CHILD

Mrs. Ella N. McFarland has sued
Jas. B. McFarland for divorce, the
papers in the suit being filed yester-
day afternoon by her attorneys,
Woodcock & Potter. The McFar-
lands were married in Eugene on
December 24, 1895, and have one
daughter, Ard's, aged 3 years. Mrs.
McFarland alleges as ground for the
divorce cruel and inhuman treat-
ment, stating that her husband is ad-
dicted to the use of intoxicating li-
quors and has been intoxicated the
greater portion of the last six
months. She alleges that during the
past several years she has been sick
several times, and during her sick-
ness her husband has cursed her and
complained on account of the expense
caused by her sickness. She says
that on account of his conduct she
was compelled to leave him on or
about July 15, 1907.

Mrs. McFarland states that her
husband is engaged in the black-
smith business at Junction City and
that he owns real property worth \$5-
000. She asks for the care and cus-
tody of the child, for \$1000 with
which to support the child, and "a
one-third of the property."
