GROWING IN SPITE

OF THE PEOPLE.

The University of Oregon is growing in spite of the people of the state. The registration for the first week of this school year was 314 against but 225 last year. This is sufficient reason to those who invoked the referendum vote on the university appropriation. The referendum is not to blame, and has not been blamed, for the vote. The grange must bear the responsibility. The grange is a good organization, too, and because it has made a mistake, should not be branded as an enemy to progress any more than the referendum amendment is. But that a serious mistake has been made in Oregon is shown by the increased registration at our own university and by the increased registration of Oregon students at the University of Washington.

AT COMING ELECTION

One week from next Monday the people of Eugene will have an opportunity to pass up the question of procuring a better water supply for the city. To say the least, present conditions are unsatisfactory, and there is no hope for improvement until a water system, owned by the people themselves, is constructed and in operation. The supply must come from an uncontaminated mountain source and it must be abundant as well as pure.

The voting of \$300,000 of bonds will place in the hands of the city council the means to carry out the wishes of the people as expressed at the polls on several different occasions and without this financial backing the administration is powerless and all efforts to secure relief must prove abortive.

Eugene, with all the boasting on earth, cannot grow into a city until this water question is settled, and settled right. Private ownership has proven a failure, and only a municipal system, owned and operated in the interest of all the people, can bring the permanent prosperity that an unquestioned water supply will guarantee.

POLICY PURSUED

Since the Carver Sluiceway railroad has been destroyed there seems to be activity in local railroad circles. The talk of raising a stock subscription to insure the early commencement of work on the proposed Eugene-Salem line has entirely died out, and Eugene was apparently deterred further from securing another railroad in any direction than at the present time. As the Guard has stated frequently, the interest of certain persons ended with the destruction of the Carver line, the movement undoubtedly falling a victim to the influence of A. Welch and associates, who, while building no railroad themselves, are determined to prevent anyone else from building this field. Welch seems to be a Harriman on a small scale, or at least aspires to be.

This Eugene-Salem proposition will so doubt be held in reserve for the purpose of being sprung again whenever anyone else comes to this city with a bona fide proposition to build a railroad.

BACK OF UNIVERSITY

The attendance at both the University of Oregon and the Agricultural college is larger than ever before, as it should be, and indicates a prosperous year for both those institutions, says the Portland Journal. It is stated, however, that Oregon students to the number of 51 are attending the University of Washington, which is to be regretted. How many of them are freshmen we do not know, but very likely some have gone there on account of the so far successful opposition to the Oregon State university appropriation. This institution ought to be, if it is not, every bit as good as the University of Washington, and to make it so the state must give it a liberal and cordial support.

And then the youth of Oregon, and their parents, should have enough state pride to depend on state colleges for the desired higher education. If the Washington university is superior to Oregon's it is so because it is more liberally supported. If we are to have a state university that will hold Oregon youths and attract outsiders we must give it ample support. And the same is true of the Agricultural college, which is an excellent institution, and constantly becoming better. The state cannot afford to be niggardly in these matters.

But notwithstanding the invocation of the referendum on the university appropriation, it starts out well, and we believe the people will rally to its support next June. This institution, and the agricultural college, are deserving of the patronage of the people of Oregon. Oregon young men and women can get as good an education, for all practical purposes, in these colleges as over in Washington, or California. Both the taxpayers and the seekers after higher education should stand by the Oregon colleges. This is the only way to make them better and the equal of any.

In a covered wagon drawn by two decrepit appearing horses, Mrs. L. A. Morgan and her two little sons, arrived yesterday after several weeks of hardship and suffering on the road between this city and Imperial Junction, Cal.

Mrs. Morgan is an elderly woman and told a story of sorrow and hardship to Chief of Police Gibson upon her arrival. The father had died years ago and left the family in a state approaching destitution, however, she had managed to secure a team and wagon and with her two small boys started for Portland, where she claims to have relatives.

Tom Jones, proprietor of Farmers' feed barn offered shelter and feed for the half-starved horses and Chief Gibson immediately started to look after the wants of the mother and her sons who were very poorly clad. He succeeded in raising over \$12 besides a large amount of clothes and provisions, which he turned over to the woman who went with joy over the kindness and aid extended to her. With this amount she will be able to reach Portland where her relatives will look after her and her sons.

HOPGROWERS RAISE

FUND; SUE S. P.

A fund is being collected by the hop dealers of Oregon for the purpose of testing the new railroad commission law in the matter of furnishing cars.

The dealers claim they have had orders for cars for hops for some time which could not be filled because the railroads would not or could not furnish transportation. They claim they are very much damaged on this account and will band together and bring suit against the Southern Pacific at once.

The dealers say that not only are they injured by the lack of cars, but it puts the hop industry in a tight place, inasmuch as there is a demand now and may not be later.—Portland Journal.
