VOTING BONDS WILL EXPRESS CONFIDENCE IN FAITHFUL OFFICIALS
 The morning paper asserts that it has no objections to municipal ownership and is perfectly willing that the people should own and control the city water supply. Then why make a dirty fight on the mayor and officials who are only seeking to carry out the pledges made to the voters before their election? Simply to earn the "advertising" fee paid it by the Willamette Valley Company, we presume.

The newspaper organ of the water company wants the city council to make all its surveys and do all of its preliminary work before it has any money to pay for the work with. Had this course been taken the criticism would have been based on the waste of public funds before the people had expressed themselves in favor of a municipal water plant. The plan was adopted once before and it raised such a howl from the people who are now demanding it that the expense bills incurred then have not yet been paid. As a matter of fact the exact plans and the details of the municipal system must be worked out after the bonds have been authorized and the city administration is now of its financial footing. The objection made to a proposed 16-inch main, instead of one much larger, comes under the same head. It is at this time merely a recommendation of the engineer, based on sound reasoning, but when plans are fully determined upon a larger main may be adopted. The 16-inch pipe, it is asserted, would afford an ample supply of water for a city of three times Eugene's present population, and when more water is needed the engineer favors the plan of laying a second 16-inch pipe along the same right of way, thus assuring the city of a water supply in event of an accident to one of the pipe lines, as it is not likely that both would be put out of commission at the same time. But these are details for competent engineers to work out.

The voters of Eugene expressed their confidence in the present city administration and the mayor when they were elected by substantial majorities only a few months ago. The signing of the bonds will be merely an expression of a continuance of that confidence now that these officials are seeking to carry out the letter of their pledges made to the people when they were before them seeking their reelection.

The Salem Journal says: "This city is like many individuals, is suffering from narrow contracted views in some directions." Why shouldn't it? It depends upon a paper like the Journal for its enlightenment? Its unjust attack upon the State University and higher education represents a view as narrow-contracted as ever any newspaper possessed. It is kind of a city the Journal says it is that paper has contributed more than its just share toward looking and encouraging the views that it now complains of.

You may be sure that the real estate broker who advertises in the Guard is not a member of the trust, intended to cheat the public. The trustee has no use for a newspaper that is big enough and independent enough to run its own business in its own way, and treat the public square and fairly at all times.
