ONE OF GREATEST ENDS IN THE COUNTRY VISITS UNIVERSITY AND HELPS COACH FROST—THINKS OREGON WILL HAVE A VERY GOOD TEAM THIS YEAR

"Red" Abbott, one of the greatest football ends in the United States, being on the University of Wisconsin team several years ago, and a critic or worth, was out helping Coach Frost last night. He took the ends under his special guidance, and they learned new stunts for an hour.

Mr. Abbott thinks that Oregon will have a very good team, but hardly thinks that the material is up to that of last year. In his opinion Pullman is the strongest team in the Northwest. Her backfield is marvelously fast and clever. Washington, he thinks, was probably faking against the high school in Seattle last Saturday, so as to deceive her opponents. Nevertheless the "Evergreen" team is a little slow in getting up ginger, and can hardly be said to be the strongest team in that state. Glenn Scott is having a try at center on the Oregon team and bids fair to hold down that position. Ferris played a good game, but did not pass well. He may make a better guard. The backfield is evidently going to be as follows: Clarke, fullback; Taylor, one half, and Zacharias the other, for a good part of the time. McIntyre is playing guard at present, though he certainly has done splendidly at whatever show he has been given behind the line. Sharkey Huston is doing great work at quarterback, but Kuykendall is doing so well that it is impossible to keep him from the pivotal position.

DIRT IS FLYING

ON NEW RAILROAD

Baker City, Or., Oct. 10.—Actual construction work on the Eagle Valley railroad from Baker City to Eagle and Pine Valleys, has been begun and a dream that has been cherished by the people of Baker City has come true. The announcement that the road was to be built was not made until the workmen were upon the ground and ready to begin operations. The committee that had the soliciting of funds in charge then let it be known to the public that they had succeeded in raising the sum of \$100,000, which the Eastern capitalists required before they would take a step toward the project.

W. J. Patterson, who represented the Citizens' Development League, was one of the most active solicitors during the campaign for funds and much credit is due him for his untiring efforts to raise the required bonus. He was given the honor of turning the first shovel of dirt which started the active operations. The beginning of work upon the road has not attracted much public attention because of the great public calamity which has befallen the city in the assassination of ex-Sheriff Harvey K. Brown.

Before leaving for the East to consult with the Eastern syndicate, W. L. Vinson, the promoter of the road, arranged with John H. Washburn for his grading outfit, consisting of several teams and scrapers, to begin work on the Baker City end of the road. Surveyors have been at work for nearly a week mapping out the route and yesterday morning the grading outfit began operations and this force will be increased as soon as practicable. From now on the work will be pushed as rapidly as possible, and before another year has passed Baker City will have rail connections with Eagle and Pine valleys.

SPRINGFIELD NEEDS MORE SCHOOL ROOM

The necessity of building a new school house is now realized more than ever. The new building that was erected across the river has not brought the relief that was expected, and with the beginning of the new school year the teachers find that the enrollment is so great that to justice to the scholars something must be done to furnish more room. The enrollment at the present time is over four hundred, and if it increases, as it usually does by the first of January the number will have increased to over five hundred. This week the eleventh teacher was employed, a Mrs. Kelly, of Eugene, to manage the overflow of pupils, and the directors are now trying to find a suitable room which can be rented for school purposes.—News.

There is an old tradition in the circus business that no man knows when he is "down and out," and that is better far to "die in harness" than to "die of rust." This is a tradition arising from conditions where men and lesser animals suffer much for the cause to which they are loyal and receive a reward by no means commensurate with the sacrifice involved. The self-sacrifice is as notable among the dumb brutes as among the men who sometimes have their say, and there are as many cases of heroism and tragedy among the non-speaking members of a traveling circus as among the much-dwelt-upon horses that "run to fires."

When the thousands who view the Gentry Bros' famous shows in parade at Eugene Tuesday, October 15, go into raptures over the beauty of "Ida," the cream colored mare which leads the parade, and call attention to her perfect lines and the remarkable coloring of mane and tail of this prize beauty among equines, they cannot be expected to know that "Ida's" proud place is one usurped, and that the horse which once held the exalted position of the "manager's own" is back in the horse tent, "left on the lot" and literally eating his heart out.

"Harry" is getting such reward as faithfulness brings, but is one of those victims of fate for whom it is ordered that the drudgery of life shall be his portion, while the adulation, praise and applause shall be for one nature has designed for the center of the stage.

All season long, from Texas, north through Oklahoma, Kansas, Missouri and Nebraska, "Harry" was the manager's horse, and from 5 o'clock each morning until 12 o'clock each night he trotted hither and thither, through mud, rain, sleet and snow, in more kinds of foul weather than the circus business has ever known before, and never tired and never "jaded down." Once each day, just before ten o'clock each morning, "Harry" was taken out of harness, washed, scrubbed, and rubbed all over his frocked hide, dressed in plumes and silver mounted harness and sent out at the head of the golden chariot, the braying bands and the mile of ponies, cages and dogs on dress parade. When parade was over they took off his brave regalia and put him back at the more serious work of life again.

"Harry" didn't mind, for he was a horse of all work and he was "out to help the show" at every stage of the game. Then came "Ida" to join the show.

Old horsemen agreed that there was no handsomer piece of horseflesh on four feet than this low-bred five-year-old, with her cream colored skin and her white mane and tail, and the second day after she "joined" the show she was given the place of honor, in the van of the parade, and "Harry," except for the hard work of the day, was relegated to the horse tent.

And now the showmen around the "lot" will tell you that every day at 10 o'clock "Harry" will get restless, and prick up his ears, and stamp and look around for the "pony punk" who used to "put him out for the parade." And he will listen, and look and fidget until the hour is well passed—until away off in the distance he hears the band strike up the first march on parade. Then down drops his head, away goes all his animation, he takes that crook in the hind leg which signifies that a horse is "at rest," and as he strikes his nose into the empty feed trough he says as plainly as any human being could:

"Well, I'm out of it again."
