RAPID INCREASE OF POPULATION CALLS FOR HURRIED BUILDING

Every house in Eugene is full and there is a demand for more dwellings. This congested condition has caused considerable of a building movement so late in the season, and a canvas of the city shows that many houses are being hurried to completion, the largest number being in the western section, although the building activity is not confined to any particular locality. Probably fifty residences are now in course of construction, and it is believed by those who are watching the trend of events that by next spring a veritable building boom may be expected.

That the population of Eugene has increased very considerably during the past year is evidenced by the public school attendance, which has reached the 1350 mark, exclusive of those children who go to the Catholic parochial school. On the basis of school attendance, as usually computed, our population should not be much if any under 10,000, although it is generally more conservatively estimated at 8000. One thing, however, is certain, that the increase of population, with the large influx of students at the university, business college and Divinity School, has crowded the city to its full capacity, and that many houses will have to be built next year if this unprecedented growth continues.

WOULD ENDOW COLLEGE FOR MILKSOPS

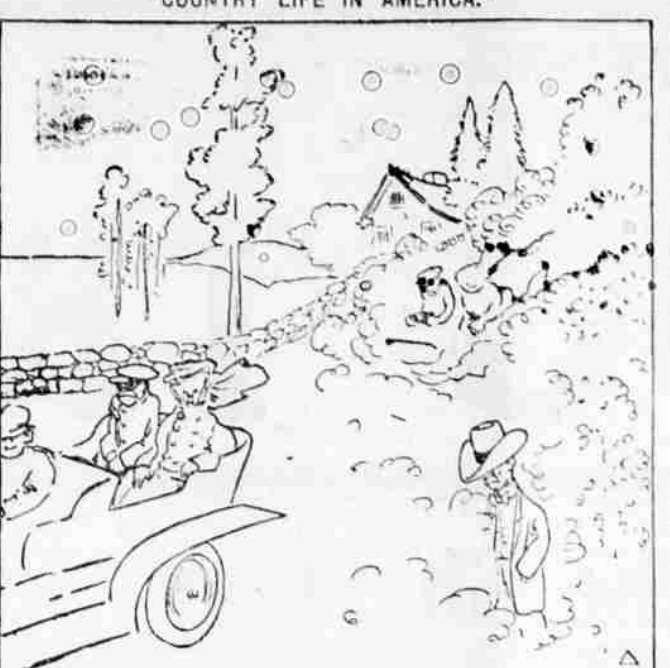

SENATOR BOURNE LOOKS AFTER NEW P. O. BUILDING

Recently the Guard requested Senator Bourne to look into the matter of the delay in beginning construction work on the government building in this city. The following letter from the senator explains the situation practically as it was given by the Guard's special correspondent at Washington a week ago. It is evident from these advices that the building will be actually begun early in the coming year. Senator Bourne's letter and an enclosure, written by the supervising architect of the treasury department, are as follows:

"In answer to your letter of September 24th, would say that I took up the matter of the Eugene public building with the supervising architect, and today received a letter from him, copy of which I herewith enclose.

"Under the circumstances I think you will appreciate that Eugene is not being discriminated against.
