CAMPBELL PLEADS FOR OPPORTUNITY FOR WORKING BOYS

President Campbell, of the State University, made a splendid appeal for popular support for the institution at the Commercial Club dinner at Portland the other night. What he particularly laid stress upon was the fact that the University was the poor boy's only hope for acquiring the advantages of higher education. President Campbell said:

"A State University stands for opportunity for the sons and daughters of the poor. The poor boy, while living at home, works his way up through the common school and the high school, but when he comes to consider any future advancement a heavy item of expense at once stares him in the face. His wealthier classmate can afford to spend \$600 to \$1500 in going East to some of the larger universities, but this is out of the question for him.

"His state university offers him tuition free and a various low scale of living expenses. The item of travel is a trifle. On from \$200 to \$300 per year he can comfortably make his way through. Two-thirds of his college mates will be earning their way, just as he is doing, so there will be little inequality of expenditure. At the University of Oregon about 70 per cent of the students are either wholly or partially earning their own way; some have walked across the mountains and landed at the University with less than \$20, and yet they won honor and opportunity by their ambition and energy. For a poor boy or girl, a college education must be near at hand and inexpensive, or ordinarily it will be missed.

"What is Oregon doing for its University? At present it appropriates less than any other state in the union. The value of departmental equipment is probably less than that of any other state university, and yet the number of students seeking education is steadily growing.

"From 230 in 1903, the enrollment of college students entering the University after completion of a high school course has increased to approximately 400 to the present year. The total enrollment, including the professional schools, will bring the number up to 600."

On the subject of the present income of the institution and the salaries paid to instructors in the University, concerning which many misrepresentations have been circulated by the advocates of the referendum, President Campbell said:

"The amount of annual appropriation asked for at the last session of the legislature was a minimum rather than a maximum requirement. Washington gave its university a total of \$1,000,000 for the biennial period and California gave about \$1,000,000 a year. The University of North Dakota has an income of above \$1,500,000 per year and the University of Utah in income of above \$1,600,000, although neither have as many college students as the University of Oregon.

"Using the involving of the referendum in the University appropriation, the University is now on a basis of about \$500,000 income, of which \$175,000 comes from the state, and approximately \$10,500 from interest-bearing funds and incidental fees. The income for the next two years has been in the neighborhood of \$750,000 per year for maintenance, salaries of building funds, though a special appropriation of the legislature of 1905. The deficiency of \$11,000 for the present year is borne by the faculty, whose salaries have been reduced by a fourth in order to take up the board of regents' having no power to contract indebtedness.

"The salaries were already low, ranging from \$300 to \$2000 for the biennial period. But one salary was in excess of \$2000, that of \$3,000 to the president of the University. Less than a fourth of the salaries were above \$1000. The ranges was as low as that of any state university and at present much lower than any other. As to the number of teachers, the University is on a minimum basis for the work required to be done. A number of departments have not been supplied with professors, notably the department of geology, which has been without a head since the resignation of Dr. Condon some three years ago. The University badly needs a department for women, which should be not less than \$70,000. The Agricultural College recently very wisely put \$85,000 into a woman's building. Additional construction buildings are also seriously needed. The

Library should have not less than \$5000 per year to keep it on a par with the smallest of the other state university libraries. It must be perfectly evident that the appropriation asked was in no sense an extravagant one."

This address, dealing with plain facts and figures, should have the effect of correcting much popular misunderstanding. It refutes at once the assertions of the Linn county grange that the University is a "rich man's school," and that it is already amply supported. Knowing the truth as President Campbell sets it forth, the people of Oregon will not deny their splendid State University the financial support that it justly asks them to extend.

HUSBAND AND WIFE NOT ONE IN LAW

That the old common law idea of the legal unity of husband and wife does not now prevail was demonstrated by a Minnesota judge a few days ago in a decision holding that it is possible for a husband to steal from his wife, and that his wife can testify against him, says an exchange. In the eyes of the common law a man and his wife were one person, and the husband was that person, and hence was incapable of larceny from himself.

This has been changed by statutory enactments in the various states giving the wife individual property and recognizing her equality with man before the law. The Minnesota decision was given in the case of a man charged with stealing a \$100 bill from his wife. Counsel for the defendant contended that his client should be discharged for two reasons, first, because husband and wife living together as such could not steal from one another; second, that the wife in the case was not a competent witness against her husband.

The court promptly disposed of the first contention by quoting the statutes relating to the property rights of married women, and held that the law must be construed as recognizing the crime of larceny by one spouse from the other. This construction of the law, it was held, would be futile if the court denied in such cases the right of one spouse to testify against the other, since it would be often by unlikely that there would be any third persons available as witnesses.

The decision presents an illustration of the progressiveness of the law. In days gone by the rule as to the unity of man and wife was supported by the courts of this country as well as England. The law, however, is constantly adjusting itself to modern civilization and significantly so in regard to the marital relation.

Last week the Junction City Times started on its seventeenth volume. Speaking of the event Brother Moorehead says: "We have never missed an issue, even when burned out. The Times came out on time. There have been a good many changes since the paper was first started. There was not a single gravel road leading into the city, nor a single house west of the Methodist church. Sidewalks were on Front street and that about tells the story. The W. S. Lee building and the Folsom building were the only brick buildings in the city. However, the next five years will show greater development than during the past sixteen, and this will soon become the greatest known valley on the Pacific coast, with a population almost equaling that of the entire state of the present time."

A PROCLAMATION

Whereas, There was submitted to the legal voters of the city of Eugene, at a special election held thereon on the 14th day of October, 1907, an initiative proposal, made and ordained by the common council of said city, pursuant to Chapter 226 of the printed laws of Oregon for the year 1907, being "an act to provide for carrying into effect the initiative and referendum powers reserved by the people, etc.," filed in the office of the secretary of state of Oregon, February 25th, 1907, for amending sections 108 and 112 of the Charter of the city of Eugene, being Chapter 252 of the laws of Oregon for the year 1905, entitled "An act to re-incorporate the city of Eugene and to repeal all acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith," filed in the office of the secretary of state of Oregon, February 18th, 1905, and

Whereas, The votes cast at said election have been on this, the 16th day of October, 1907, duly canvassed and it has been legally ascertained and determined that there was cast at said election 595 effective votes in favor of said proposed amendment, and 175 effective votes against said proposed amendment, and that said proposed amendment received an affirmative majority of all said effective votes or ballots cast at said election and entitled to be counted.

Now, therefore, I, J. D. Matlock, mayor of said city of Eugene, by virtue of the authority vested in me by said act of February 25th, 1907, do hereby make proclamation and announce and declare that the whole number of ballots and votes cast for or against said proposed amendment are as stated above, and that said proposed amendment received an affirmative majority of all ballots and votes cast at said election and entitled to be counted, under the provisions of law in that behalf provided, and that the said proposed amendment, from the date of this proclamation be and the same are in full force and effect as a law of the state of Oregon, and as a part of said act of February 18th, 1905, being said charter of said city.

In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and the seal of the city of Eugene, this 16th day of October, 1907, and caused the seal of the city to be hereunto affixed.
