NEXT SATURDAY IS DATE OF BIG INTERCOLLEGIATE GAME — LAST SATURDAY'S GAME HERE SHOWED TEAM STRONG ON OFFENSE—O. A. C. HAS GOOD TEAM

The University of Oregon football team meets the University of Idaho team in Portland next Saturday on Multnomah athletic field. The game is the first of the series which will actually determine the championship of the Northwest. Idaho is quite confident, and Oregon students also have the greatest of faith in their team.

Oregon's lineup will be a line of veterans. Only one man of the probable lineup, Taylor, is not an old college veteran. His demonstrations in practice and in the game with Pacific prove him to be a very fast, aggressive player, however.

The lineup will probably be as follows: Centre, Scott; guards, Moulton and McIntire; tackles, Arnsperger and Pinkham; ends, Coleman, Captain Moors or a substitute; half backs, Zacharias, Taylor or Oberhauser; full back, Clarke; quarter, Kuykendall.

The behavior of the team last Saturday was far above the quality at the corresponding time last year. The defense of the team, however, had no time to show itself, and that important essential will be unknown until the Idaho game. Coleman was fine on defense, and his work was better than it was expected to be. Coleman is an able successor to

will be a better man with the ball. to play on defense, but what little they did do was done, it seemed. In (several) play more than concerted defensive work. In running the ends and in line smashing they seemed wonderful, but when pitted against a powerful team their interference should go lower, and not stand quite so high in the air.

Coch Froot, however, has a week in which to correct these and other faults he may see, and by that time the team will be in the prime of condition.

A great bunch of rooters will accompany the players. In Portland they will be joined by the law and medical departments, which have been having as assiduously practicing the Oregon yell.

Chase Talks.
Coach Chase, of Willamette, who was judge at the game here Saturday, compared the Oregon and Washington teams. He said Washington had splendid formations and interference. If Oregon can break these up she can win. Oregon's team is the faster and more aggressive, and if her defense is strong she will defeat the Seattle team.

Moulton's Adventures.
Fred Moulton Saturday wandered over to see O. A. C. marshal his forces against the clubmen from Astoria. The Astoria won by the score of 26 to 9. Moulton refereed the game incidentally, and received splendid treatment at the hands of Norecross and his men. He penalized the Corvallis team the most, too, but the farmers played pluckily on without whimpering.

He says their team is a splendid aggregation and played great ball. The clubmen, however, were not nearly so strong as when Oregon played them last year and won by the score of 10 to 9.

The "Aggies" have a heavy team, which is very fast. The ends are said to be weak, and their use of the forward pass poor. Altogether they promise to be worthy foes when they come to Eugene in a little less than two weeks.

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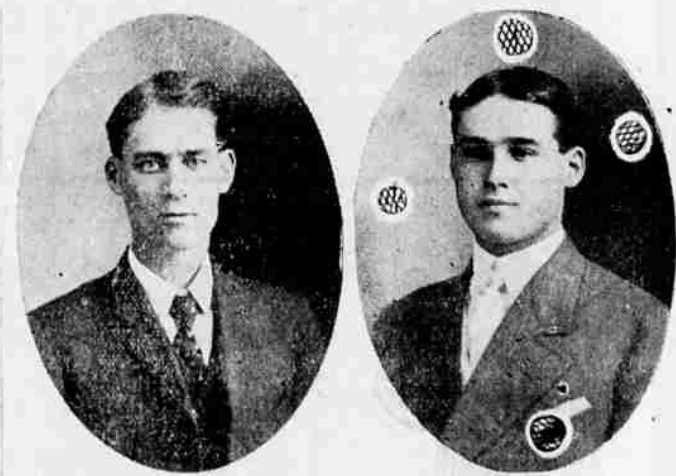
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
