NEWS NOTES FROM LOWER SIUSLAW

ROADS AND TRAILS BEING BUILT--AUTOMOBILE EXCURSION ON BEACH

School opened last week in the Upper Indian Creek district with Charles Hovey at the helm. The steamer Roberts returned to Florence Saturday afternoon after a

two weeks' absence at Cook Bay. The schooner Hugh Hogan came in last Friday and is taking on a cargo at the Oregon & California Lumber Company's wharf. As the launch Alberta was making her regular trip down the river yesterday her crew captured a deer which they noticed swimming in the stream. Donald Stevenson, a son of Ex-County Superintendent Stevenson, was in Florence last Saturday. He now holds a position in the coast geodetic service of the government. A crew of men and teams are at work opening the road over the di-

vide between upper Sweet creek and Maple creek. The county court has granted another appropriation to be expended for this purpose. The settlers of upper Sweet creek have opened a new trail to Point Terrace. Its course follows down the creek and avoids all the steep grades. The old trail crosses a high grade, making it very steep and hard to travel. C. M. Hall, of Eugene, has rented Mrs. Jessie Boughton's ranch at Swishome. He intends to stock the place with cows and run a first-class dairy. We understand the postoffice at Swishome will not be discontinued, as was reported, but that Mr. Hall will look after the business of the office. An automobile excursion on the beach between the Siuslaw and the Clatsop rivers was given last Sunday. Some of our people took the opportunity to have a rapid ride in the car and one round trip was made, but on the way back from the second trip the machine became disabled and was left near Ten Mile creek. It was not in order next day and went to Cook Bay. The schooner Sausalito, which had been lying off the mouth of the river several days, crossed in over the bar last Friday and loaded with lumber at the Oregon & California Lumber Company's mill. Her centerboard was damaged on the way up from the city, leaving the vessel in poor condition for boating against the wind. This was the reason the flag was displayed at half mast. After arriving here the damage was soon repaired and the schooner is in good order for another trip.--Eugene West.

DEDICATION OF NORWEGIAN LUTHERAN CHURCH

HANDSOME HOUSE OF WORSHIP RECENTLY REMODELED AND RENOVATED CONSECRATED TO PUBLIC WORSHIP--SERVICES LARGELY ATTENDED YESTERDAY

Yesterday was a memorable day for the Norwegian Lutheran church of Eugene and vicinity, for the handsome house of worship which they bought this fall and have remodeled and repainted, was dedicated with appropriate ceremonies. The services were conducted by Rev. N. J. Ellestad, of Chicago, who is vice-president of the Norwegian Lutheran church of America. He delivered a powerful sermon and congratulated the members of the local church and their pastor, Rev. M. P. Dommersnaes, on their good fortune in securing such a beautiful place of worship and upon their splendid growth since the church has been organized. Rev. J. C. Reinertsen, of Silverton, the first pastor of the church, Rev. L. Kristensen, a returned missionary from China, who has been staying at Springfield for some time, and the pastor assisted in the services in the forenoon. In the afternoon Attorney S. P. Ness, who is secretary of the church, spoke, giving a history of the church and impressing upon the members the importance of responding liberally with substantial financial assistance when called upon. There were quite a number of good offerings toward a fund to pay off the debt on the church, and it will not be very long until every cent of the indebtedness is paid. The services yesterday were all largely attended, the auditorium being completely filled.



NORWEGIAN LUTHERAN CHURCH B. REDEDICATED YESTERDAY.

Trinity Norwegian Lutheran church of Eugene was organized by Rev. J. C. Reinertsen, of Silverton, Oregon, in September, 1904, and shortly after organizations were effected at Spencer Creek and Llewellyn. Rev. Reinertsen served the congregation in connection with his own charge up until recently, when Rev. Dommersnaes became pastor. Having been sent here by the mission board of the church in America, he preached his first sermon in Eugene July 7, 1907. July 10 an informal meeting was held to discuss ways and means of securing a church building. The result was that an option on the old Cumberland Presbyterian church building at the corner of East Sixth and Pearl streets was taken, it then being owned by M. D. Mitchell and T. H. Garrett. A preliminary canvass for subscriptions was made and a good sum secured. A contract for the purchase of the church followed, and on August 8 the opening service was conducted in the presence of a large congregation. Regular services have been kept up since. The church has been wonderfully transformed, having been thoroughly overhauled and repainted inside and out and the walls handsomely papered so that it is now one of the handsomest church homes in the city. The Sunday school continues to be a feature of the church and has been temporarily transformed into a residence for the pastor until a parsonage can be built.

The Pastor.
Rev. M. P. Dommersnaes, the present pastor, was ordained into the ministry in June, 1891, at Kington, Minn., and is now 43 years of age. He served at Cresco, Iowa, for ten years, and went from there to Denver, Colo., where he organized three congregations and built two churches--one at Denver and one at Longmont. He built the first Norwegian church in Colorado, and his property is now valued at \$10,000. He served there for six years, and in view of his recognized ability as an organizer he was sent to Eugene by the mission board of the united church to look over the work here and at contiguous points. The exact membership of the local church is not known but it has grown rapidly since Rev. Dommersnaes began his work. There were two baptisms at yesterday's services and two weeks from yesterday there will be a class of eight young people confirmed.
