## MERCHANTS' BANK OPEN FOR BUSINESS THIS MORNING

HANDSOME BANKING ROOMS IN HAMPTON BLOCK THROWN OPEN AND BUSINESS ON FIRST DAY WAS RUSHING—DIRECTORATE COMPOSED OF SOLID CITIZENS

The new Merchants' Bank of Eugene opened for business this morning at 9 o'clock, and judging from the first day's business the institution is going to be a splendid success. All day depositors were lined up at the cashier's window, placing their surplus cash in the new bank for safe keeping.

The directorate of the new institution is composed of solid citizens of the city, thus insuring stability and conservatism. They are all young men, as are a majority of the stockholders in the institution. Some of the merchants of the city will do all of their banking business with the new bank, but others are dividing between it and the other institutions.

The officers of the new bank are as follows: S. S. Spencer, president; L. H. Potter, vice president; F. N. McAllister, cashier. There is at present no assistant cashier, but the rush of business will necessitate one soon. The directors are as follows: S. S. Spencer, formerly of the Eugene Loan & Savings bank; L. H. Potter and F. N. McAllister, formerly of the First National bank; M. F. Griggs, retired capitalist; Fred Flak, sheriff; F. J. Berger, hardware merchant, and Allen Hampton, dry goods merchant.

The interior of the new banking house in the Hampton block at Seventh and Willamette streets is handsomely finished in the native woods and the floor is of rich mahogany, a new material and handsome. The iron grill work to go over the counters has not yet arrived, giving the place an unfinished appearance, but it will be here within a week and when placed in position the banking room will be as handsome as any in the city.
