NEW VALLEY BASEBALL LEAGUE

BEING PLANNED

EUGENE AND SPRINGFIELD TO PUT IN TOGETHER AND SUPPORT ONE TEAM

EIGHT TEAMS IN PROPOSED ORGANIZATION, TWO AT PORTLAND AND ONE EACH AT SALEM, ALBANY, OREGON CITY, WOODBURN AND ST. JOHNS

It is probable that if sufficient encouragement is found among residents of the upper valley cities Eugene will be represented in a new Willamette valley baseball league, semi-professional in character.

It is proposed to have a league with seven towns in the valley represented.

resented and eight teams. The proposition is now being agitated by H. K. Smith, secretary of the Tri-City baseball league, of Portland, and he is now in correspondence with baseball enthusiasts in the various valley towns relative to securing their aid in forming the new league. The Tri-City league will not be organized next year, but will be merged in the proposed valley league according to present plans. Secretary Smith, of the Tri-City league, has written to Jay McCormick and Sid Smith, of this city, presenting his proposition and asking Eugene to enter the proposed league. As planned the new baseball league will be composed of Portland, Oregon City, Salem, Albany, Eugene, Woodburn and St. Johns. Astoria and Kelso will be dropped as they are too far off the circuit, and the four Portland baseball teams of the Tri-City league, the Frakes, Cubs, Trunkmakers and Brewers, will be merged into two clubs.

According to the plans the Eugene and Springfield baseball clubs of this year will be represented in the proposed new league by one team. Secretary Smith is confident that a valley league can be made to pay expenses, provided the people in the towns concerned take proper interest.

The past season the Tri-City league came out at the end of the season \$1600 ahead of expenses. The only team in the league that was compelled to drop out was the Woodburn nine. Secretary Smith states that this team would have been able to finish the season had not the business management offered such high salaries for players. In the new league it is planned to fix the salary limit at a certain figure and no team in the league will be allowed to pay over this amount for players. By this method it is believed every town in the league can support the team.

CORVALLIS WANTS ELECTRIC RAILWAY THROUGH THERE

Charles Baker, of the Hotel Corvallis, was in Albany today. He reported an effort being made to secure the electric line going through Albany to Eugene by way of Corvallis. A live move will be necessary, for it is already being located some distance east of the Willamette in Oregon precinct and the preliminary survey is being rushed south a long way from the Corvallis ferry—Albany Democrat.
