RAILROAD SITUATION

IS BADLY MIXED

What is the real railroad situation in Western Oregon, as affecting the Willamette valley? Who is back of the various electric and steam lines that are being constructed on paper in all directions? These would be hard questions to answer, for, as the Pendleton Tribune says, no class of business men move in a more sphinx-like manner than those having in charge the building of railroads. Indeed, they usually move in a mysterious way their wonders to perform. Surveying parties go through different parts of the country, without giving out any information, though as a rule it is likely they have none themselves beyond their direct instructions. The people look on while they guess and wait.

Recently when Mr. Carver proposed to build a railroad from Eugene to the Siuslaw it was branded by many as a "Southern Pacific scheme." This was the excuse that some of those people made who were so anxious to switch over to the Welch proposition to build an electric line from Eugene to Salem. Welch proposes to build a competing line that will not be sold to the Southern Pacific, for the very good reason, as some people aver, that the Harriman interests will own the road from the start. Nobody knows, outside of the inner circle of financiers, what is really going on in the railroad world. Commenting upon the Willamette valley situation the Woodburn Independent has this to say, though between the lines a disposition to boom its own town is plainly seen:

"Harriman did not take the trouble to go into the wilds of Eastern Oregon enough to make the impression that he would not build there for the next decade, but intended to do so as soon as possible, hence his looking over the ground. Now that the cat is out of the bag we will give Mr. Harriman's plan as it pertains to this section. It is a well-known fact that the Oregon Electric railway is a Harriman line, which will give Salem, Albany and Eugene service to Portland. The main Southern Pacific road will be by way of Woodburn, Natron and Klamath Falls, so as to avoid the big expensive grade at the Siskiyou. This is why the present line to Salem, Albany and Eugene will be converted into a branch principally for freight; these cities are to be given motor line service. The transcontinental trains will traverse the proposed main line by way of Natron. Successful and profitable railroading now is to get grades down to a minimum. Eastern railroad companies have expended millions of dollars to lower their grades a few inches. The Southern Pacific is looking chiefly to through traffic, and Woodburn will be the most important railroad junction in the state, and in accordance with the plan a spur will be run in here from the electric road and then extended to Scott's Mills."
