HOW OREGON

DEFEATED IDAHO

ON CRIBBING FIELD

Portland, Or., Oct. 26.—Another game has been played and another victory won by the University of Oregon eleven. The Idaho, as yet an undefeated eleven, went down to defeat today before the lemon yellow warriors from Eugene to the tune of 21 to 5. Throughout the game the Oregon men showed superior team work, and excelled in straight football.

The Idaho men played a brilliant game, but it was of the sensational order, practically all their gains being made on trick plays and forward passes. In this line of work the Idaho men sprung many surprises upon their opponents which, at a time, dumfounded the Oregon team and as a result Idaho was allowed to score.

The first half kept the large crowd of 3000 people on the qui vive. In five minutes of play Oregon had scored a place kick which was sent through the goal posts by the trusty right foot of Fred Moulten. Oregon seemed to be vastly superior. Before ten minutes more had elapsed, however, Idaho had worked the ball down the whole length of the field by a series of straight forward passes and trick plays and scored a touchdown. Oregon's blood was then aroused. Kaykendall caught a punt on Oregon's twenty-five yard line, and aided by the brilliant interference of Zacharias and Clark, ran through the remaining 85 yards for a touchdown. Moulten kicked the goal.

In the second half Clark and Taylor, for Oregon, each scored a touchdown after a series of forward passes and line bucks. One goal was not kicked so the final score of the game stood, Oregon, 21; Idaho, 5.

Coach Frost is jubilant over the showing made by his men and now is more confident of Oregon's chances for the Northwest championship. Both teams were banqueted tonight by the members of the University Club.

STATISTICS

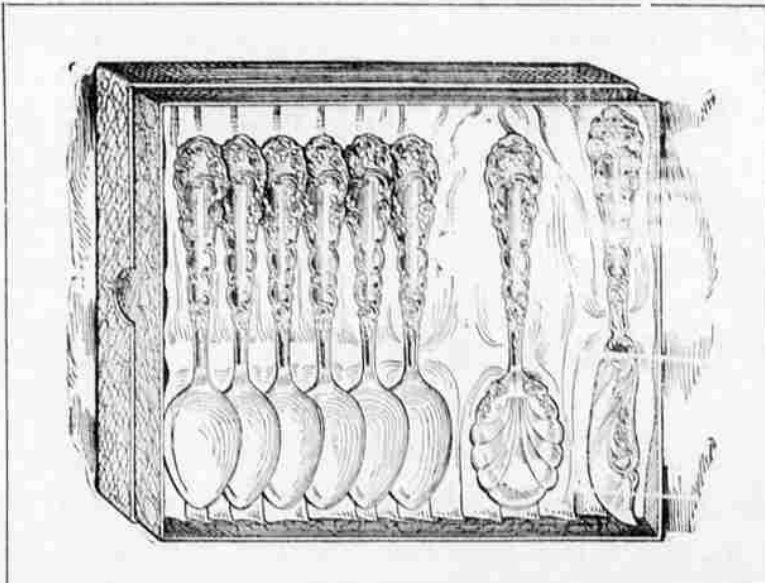

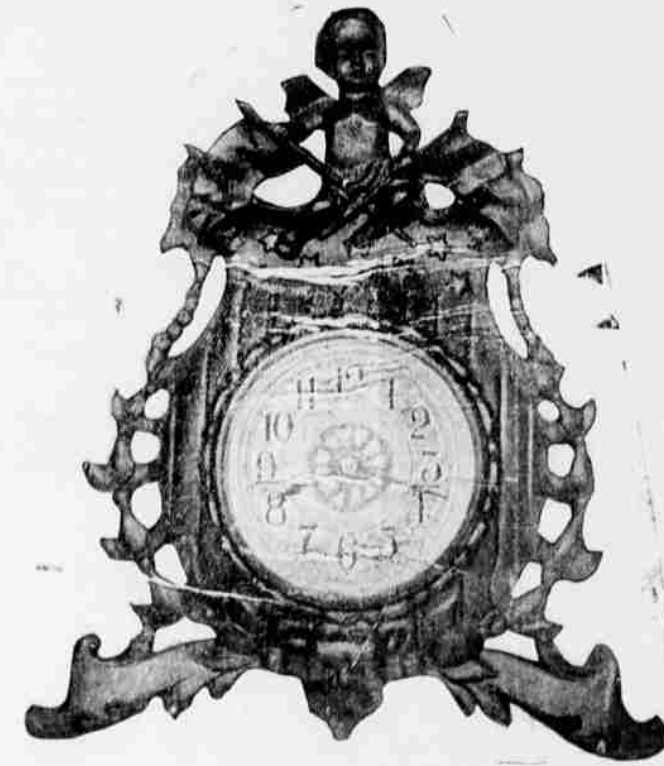
