OREGON ELECTRIC AND WELCH LINE SEPARATE AFFAIRS

In a few days cars will be running between Portland and Salem on the electric road of the Oregon Electric Company. Portland's first great feeder to reach out through the valley, says the Albany Democrat. The plan of the company, which Messrs. Moffitt and White, rich Eastern bankers, are the principal stockholders, is to come up the valley as far as Albany and make a loop connecting with the west side at Corvallis. The company will have one line up the valley about 25 miles this side of Portland, where a line will diverge from the present Salem road, cross the river to Hillsboro and then come up the west side to Corvallis and down the river to Albany. From Albany a branch line will run to Lebanon, and perhaps further, and eventually the main line will go further up the valley to Eugene and other points.

Guy W. Talbot, manager of the company, authorized the Democrat to state that the proposed electric line of A. Welch, for which franchises and rights-of-way are being secured, has no connection whatever with his line, being entirely independent of it, that when the company is ready to build south from Salem, which will be as soon as the money market loosens up, it will be on its own survey and right-of-way, and that Albany at the proper time will be asked for a franchise for the company. There is an impression that the Welch line south from Salem is an extension of the Oregon Electric Company. Mr. Talbot wishes it made plain that there is absolutely no connection between the two companies, that his company has its own plans separate from any other, which will be pushed forward as rapidly as possible, giving the valley an east and west side service of its own. Mr. Moffitt, who has made a study of the situation, is very much pleased with this valley, and its prospects, and will use his best efforts for its development.
