

RUSSIAN SAILORS MUTINY AND ATTACK FORTRESS

Tokio, Oct. 26.—The Jiji this afternoon published a dispatch from Vladivostok that the crews of two Russian torpedo boats mutinied and attacked the city from the sea. The soldiers garrisoning the fortress responded with a brisk fire and one torpedo boat, according to the dispatch, was destroyed. There is great excitement at Vladivostok, but the amount of damage is not known. The Jiji does not vouch for the accuracy of the report.

GOVERNOR TRYING TO RESCIND DECREE

the East. The banks here are all in a normal condition and there was no idea of their closing until the governor's proclamation was announced.

After the closing hour this afternoon President T. G. Hendricks, of the First National Bank, reported to the Board that the bank had had a pleasant day, more so than was expected, and much more money was taken in than was taken out. He confidently expects normal conditions to return shortly, and ascribes the Western shortage solely to the Eastern stringency. Western banks being unable to get the money due them in the East. He received a wire from Vice President Eakin, who is in Portland, stating that everything is quiet there and the banks are today doing business in the same manner that the Eugene banks are.

W. W. Brown, assistant cashier of the Eugene Loan & Savings Bank, stated that business was entirely satisfactory, and that almost the normal volume was transacted today. There were no unusual features in the day's business, and money paid in exceeded the amount paid out. Mr. Brown shares the optimistic view of other bankers that the unexpected hurry will soon pass into history without affecting materially the unexampled prosperity of the Northwest.

No Courts in Session.

No business in the circuit, justice or county courts can be transacted while this holiday is on. The adjourned term of the Lane county circuit court was to have convened this morning, but court will not convene until next Monday, the date of the opening of the regular November term. There are several cases pending in Justice of the Peace Bryson's court, but nothing can be done until the holiday is over. County commissioners' court does not convene until next Wednesday, hence this holiday does not affect that body.

Business Dull Yesterday.

The postoffice is observing regular hours and every other line of business is open the same as usual. Merchants reported business very quiet yesterday on account of the closing of the banks. Many people who keep all their money in the banks were unable to draw anything, therefore put off their daily shopping until their cash becomes available.

Won't Affect Building Operations.

It is thought that the present flurry in the financial situation will not affect building operations in Eugene. Those who have brick buildings in the embryonic state are going right ahead with their plans and it is thought, therefore, that there will be no delay whatever in the beginning of construction work. Lester Hull has the architect's plans for his two-story brick on East Ninth street nearly completed, and announces that the old frame building on the lot will be moved away within a few days and excavation will begin immediately thereafter. The Eagles are going ahead with their building project, and now announce that the proposed structure may be three stories high instead of two. The work of excavating for the new Chambers block will be resumed as soon as the ground becomes dry again and the contract for the erection of the building will soon be let. The promoters of the new hotel project are still working on the matter and something concerning the enterprise may be given to the public within a few days. Announcement of other new buildings may be made soon.

Electric Light Warnings.

NEW RULING ON HOMESTEAD ENTRIES

Commissioner R. A. Ballinger, of the general land office, has issued a circular letter to the registrars and receivers of land offices as follows: "Sir—You are hereby directed to at once inform all newspapers in your respective districts, as a matter of news, that in all cases where homestead entries are made after November 1, 1907, commutation proofs must show actual and bona fide residence for the full period of twelve months."

In all cases where the entries were made before November 1, 1907, the rule heretofore existing that six months' constructive residence following the date of the entry will be considered as a part of the required fourteen months' residence, will remain in force.

You are directed to give this matter immediate attention and as wide publicity as possible, and post a copy of this letter in a conspicuous place in your office.
