RAILROAD QUESTION

WILL COME TO FRONT

One of the things that will result from the present financial flurry will be the concentration of public attention upon the railroad problem. The people ought to be able to see now how completely the country is in the grip of the transportation monopoly. Half a dozen railroad magnates possessed of enormous wealth through a system of joint control and combination in competing lines, the issue of vast quantities of bonds and watered stock, which a glib public has purchased and paid for with good money, are able to hold up the development of the country, to force the nation almost without notice to the verge of a panic by their control of the finances of the United States.

At the present time railroad barons, incensed at the administration's attempts to force them to obey the laws and to accept certain salutary regulations, are engaged in teaching the president and his advisers a lesson that they will not soon forget. They have smashed the stock market, terrorized the banks, and clearly jeopardized the business of the country in the midst of the most prosperous era in its history.

In the West they have refused to build needed extensions, to furnish cars, and last and worst of all, have placed such prohibitive rates on lumber shipments as to close down tight the great saw milling industry of the Northwest.

All these things are going to make the people think, and when the question has been thoroughly considered a great many more people will believe with Mr. Bryan that the railroads should be owned by the people and operated in their interest instead of being managed solely in the furtherance of private gain amassed from plundering the public.

THE BEST TRAINING

Somewhere in the West a father has built for his boys a bungalow remote from the home, and in that bungalow they are to live and do all the cooking, washing and other work usually done by woman's hands. They are to be their own masters entirely free from home restraint. It is all done, we are told, that the boys may learn self-reliance and independence, and to take up the responsibilities of life. Naturally the arrangement pleases the boys greatly. They are proud of their little republic and doubtless they will get lots of experience.

But we are not charmed with the plan. To be sure it is good to be an all-around boy—to know how to cook, sew, etc., as well as to be self-reliant. But boys have learned and will still learn these accomplishments just as well at home. The one fatal defect in the plan, though it may not always reveal itself immediately, is the withdrawal of the boy from the wholesome restraint of the home life in the formative and most critical period of his existence. There is nothing that can equal the conserving influence of home, the gentle and refining presence of the mother and the strong guidance of the father. The reverence, filial obedience and other virtues acquired in the home circle are more valuable assets to possess when working out life's problems than anything that may be obtained by playing at Robinson Crusoe or Swiss Family Robinson.

The United States treasury school for bank presidents has another student ready for his diploma—Comptroller Hildley, son-in-law of Senator Callum—but the \$25,000 salary of the bank was declined, probably because of too much Helms, and he is still open to offers.

That nine-year-old English boy who said as soon as he landed in New

York that he would rather be president of the United States than king of England, has the making of either a great diplomatist or a confidence man in him. Chicago, where he is to make his home, will do the rest.

WANTON HUNTERS

KILL FIVE ELK

Mr. Morrow, a well-known surveyor, who was in town yesterday, states that while up on Crabtree creek near Morgan's cabin he came upon the body of a full-grown elk. The head had been cut off the animal and could not be found, but the rest of the body had been left on the trail to rot. The big elk was lying only a short distance from where its three female companions killed by George and Edward Smith were found. Mr. Morrow says that a short distance from the big male elk he also found another female elk lying dead. Both animals had been shot, and left to rot, the hunters making no use of the meat. Residents around where the elk were shot are not backward in asserting that the guilty persons are and are intended that in the recent trial in the justice court at Lebanon a heavier fine was not assessed the defendant who pleaded guilty to killing two elk. It is now said to be practically certain that the same hunters who confessed to killing three elk also killed the big bull elk and its female companion. The case would seem to be one for the investigation of the game warden.—Albany Herald.

OBITUARY.

Edward Harris Bates was born in Newark, New Jersey, in 1850, and died in Eugene, Oregon, October 24, 1907, aged 57 years and nine months.

He was married at San Juan, Monterey county, California, in 1870. His wife and eleven children survive him, three of whom were able to be present at the funeral.

Mr. Bates was one of the pioneers of the Pacific coast. He came to Oregon in 1874 and has resided in Oregon and California ever since. He was a veteran of the Indian war and rendered splendid service in Mexico.

He was a member of the Episcopal church. He has been a model father, an ideal husband and a loyal citizen. He was deputy sheriff at Rhodes, Tulare county, and also county superintendent of that county.

For months he has been the victim of the dread disease cancer, which was the cause of his death.

The funeral was held at the house 156 Lawrence street at 11 o'clock Thursday morning, October 31, Rev. D. H. Trimble officiating.
