REV. T. B. FORD'S TRIBUTE TO DR. I. D. DRIVER

Rev. T. B. Ford, of Portland, formerly presiding elder of the Methodist church for the Eugene district, and who lived here for several years, in an interview paid the following tribute to Rev. I. D. Driver, who died at Tazewell Wednesday:

"Dr. Driver was a useful man, a useful citizen and a useful preacher. He was one of the most notable in Oregon's history or in that of the whole country. His influence was wider than that of the Oregon conference—it was national. Every one knew of Dr. Driver and his brilliant and logical defenses of Christianity from the attacks of agnostics."

"He was intimately associated with Dwight L. Moody, the famous evangelist, in the latter's work in Chicago, and occupied the platform with Mr. Moody during the latter's revival services in that city, and worked with him there for some time."

"When Watts, the famous English agnostic, challenged Moody to debate Christianity in Chicago, Moody chose Dr. Driver to help him in the debate. And it said that no one who heard the memorable addresses will ever forget that delivered by Dr. Driver. It was a masterpiece of logic."

"At the time of his clash with Ingersoll in Eugene no meeting had been arranged but each man did his best to refute the arguments of the other. Ingersoll was the brilliant orator and Driver the logician. Those who heard the debates, of course, differ as to which had the advantage, although the preponderance of opinion seemed to be that Driver had the best of it, he giving facts that Ingersoll, with all of his wit, was unable to answer."

"Driver was a man of wonderful knowledge of science, history, law and theology. He had never had any educational advantages, but had studied himself and knew Greek, Latin and Hebrew better than most college graduates. He had a remarkable brain. He was a man of force and individuality and untiring devotion to Christian doctrine. But his work was not confined to the church. He was a good father and husband, as well as a politician of no mean ability—he took part in several state campaigns and served in the legislature. His physical strength was as remarkable as his mental powers. The state and church have lost a useful and valuable man in his death."

"When asked for a personal appreciation of Dr. Driver, Rev. Dr. C. E. Cline, of Portland, said:

"Dr. Driver was a sort of steam engine in breeches. He was pugnacious and yet had a heart as tender as a woman's. His work was unique, and yet, like that of Peter Cartwright, his adaptability passed away with his time. We shall not see Dr. Driver's like again."

T. G. HAILEY WILL DELIVER ELKS' MEMORIAL ADDRESS

Eugene lodge, B. P. O. E., will hold its annual lodge of sorrow, of memorial services, in memory of departed brothers, this year in the Eugene theatre, and the services will be of a public nature. The first Sunday in December is the Elks' memorial day, and this year it falls on December 1. The lodge has selected Hon. T. G. Hailey, of Portland, to deliver the address of the occasion at the services, and a program of interest is being prepared by the committee in charge. Mr. Hailey has the reputation of being one of the most eloquent orators in the state, and the local lodge is considered fortunate in securing him. The program to be rendered will be published later. The services will be held at 2:30 p. m. sharp.

NO RETRENCHMENT FOR NORTHERN PACIFIC

St. Paul, Minn., Oct. 31.—President Louis W. Hill, of the Great Northern, tonight denied the report that the road was to stop construction work.

"I cannot see how the report originated," he said to the Associated Press. "The Great Northern has not stopped construction work, and does not intend to. We see no reason to do so. We are shipping men West all the time."

President Elliott, of the Northern Pacific, said: "The Northern Pacific is going on with its construction in Washington and Montana, but is cutting down its force in Wisconsin and Minnesota."

BIDS FOR WATER BONDS SOLICITED

Sealed proposals will be received by the common council of the city of Eugene until 7:30 o'clock p. m. of January 6th, 1908, at which time at the council chamber in said city said council will open and consider such proposals for the purchase of the whole or any part of an issue of \$200,000 water bonds of said city. These bonds will be issued in denominations of \$100 to \$1000, will be payable principal and interest in gold coin, will bear date January 1st, 1908, will be due January 1st, 1948, with an option in the city to pay the same or any thereof on any interest day subsequent to January 1st, 1922, and will bear interest at the rate of 5 per cent per annum, payable semi-annually. These bonds are issued under authority of an act of the legislative assembly of the state of Oregon, entitled, "An act to reincorporate the city of Eugene and to repeal all acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith," filed in the office of the secretary of state February 18th, 1905, as amended by the initiative bill filed in the office of the recorder of said city July 1st, 1907, and approved by the voters of said city at an election held October 14, 1907.
