



ELECTRIC RAILWAY WILL CONTINUE IMPROVEMENTS

All improvements that are now under way by the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company are to be continued, says the Portland Journal. Furthermore, the work is to be carried to completion.

There has been no falling off in the receipts of the various car lines. The collections for power are going on as usual, many of which are paid in checks, which has been the custom heretofore.

The business of the company has not been interfered with in the least. Consequently the officials are carrying out their plans for the improvement of the roadbed and service, just as if financial conditions were normal.

These details were given out this morning by B. J. Josselyn, president of the Portland Railway, Light and Power Company, during an interview.

Mr. Josselyn has as his guest this week G. L. Estabrook, of Philadelphia, assistant treasurer of E. W. Clark & Co., bankers, and one of the principal owners of the Portland property.

Mr. Josselyn said that Mr. Estabrook's visit to Portland had no particular significance further than it was for the purpose of familiarizing himself with the company's holdings here. Mr. Estabrook is accompanied by his wife and will remain several weeks. They arrived this morning at the Hotel Portland. The representative of the Eastern bankers said that the present financial flurry had nothing to do with his visit here and that he had left the East several weeks ago. Since then he has been in the South visiting Los Angeles, San Francisco and other places.

"I can't say that we are to begin any new work," Mr. Josselyn said, "but we certainly intend to carry to completion the work we have under way at present. The Mount Scott double-track deal stands just as it did some time ago. We have simply been making an examination of the lines to see what the approximate cost of laying the double tracks would be."
