BRIGHTER PROSPECTS

IN FINANCIAL SITUATION NOW

There are many evidences that the worst in the financial flurry has already passed. It came so quickly that many financiers seemingly lost their heads and their panic added to the general alarm and excitement. Now, however, people have had time to stop and think the situation over and already steps are being taken to recall much of the radical action taken without due consideration. Railroads and other large business interests are finding that actual business is just as good as ever and quite likely much of the improvement work announced as given up will be resumed. The Hill roads will keep on with their work in the West just the same as before, the Portland Electric and Power Company, through the Portland papers, announces that it will not curtail its present plans, because its business is apparently as good as ever. Only the Harriman roads are taking off their construction crews—and Harriman is ever ready to delay any proposed improvement in the West, looking constantly for some pretext to justify his non-action, as long as his supremacy in the field is not endangered. What Harriman does in the way of laying off construction crews should never be taken too seriously.

The worst blow to the Northwest is the increased freight rate on lumber, which has had the effect of closing many mills, but there is reason to believe that even this calamity has been exaggerated, and that business in this industry will gradually be renewed until it will reach normal conditions again after a few weeks. The courts have restrained the railroads from collecting the increased freight rate, and there is a feeling that the interstate commerce commission will never allow it to be put into effect. This fact has already caused many sawmill concerns to resume operations, or to actively prepare for early resumption.

Taken altogether, the outlook in the Northwest is brighter than a week ago, when the blow fell so suddenly, and it is materially improved by more cheering reports from the East, where a condition approaching the normal is already in sight.

We are used to seeing delegations from large trade centres tour the country in the interest of their cities and their various lines of business. But it is comparatively new thing to have delegations come from foreign countries with a similar object. Some three dozen Brazilian business men have recently come to this country to see how they may better secure trade from us and buy from us. This is a good thing for more than one reason. It will not only promote commerce between the two countries, which is the immediate object, but it will do much to bring about a better understanding between the United States and the South and Central American nations. In spite of efforts made by our statesmen and diplomats, those nations are still somewhat suspicious of us. To remove that feeling there is nothing equal to a personal acquaintance such as these Brazilian merchants are forming. We may be sure that they will go home with a more accurate knowledge of this country, and that will produce nothing but good.

Bank note circulation will be increased \$30,000,000 this week. With the coinage of millions of gold bullion, now lying in the mints, and the importation of millions more from Europe, there should soon be a decided relief in the money situation.

An American missionary about to depart for Japan says he will teach the Japs baseball and football as a preliminary to converting them. Inasmuch as the Japs have a reputation

for ball juggling, they may also teach him a few things.

Former Secretary of the Navy Long offers a new reason for sending the big fleet to the Pacific. He says it will tickle our Pacific brethren "by giving them a chance to see and supply our navy."

Eugene's banks are solid and the people know it. But for the Portland bunch losing their heads the financial flurry never would have touched Oregon, especially Lane county.

If those supporters of Fairbanks who insist that he is still in the race will visit the betting rings they could easily place all of their coin at odds of at least 100 to 1.

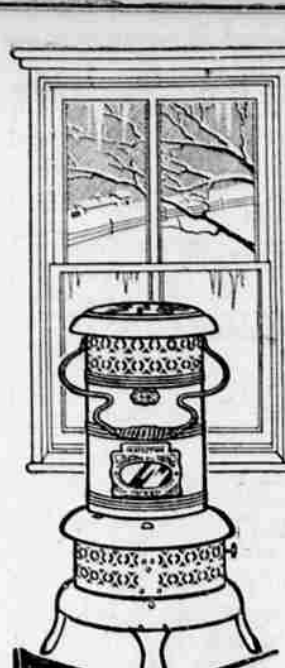
