CORPORATE GREED MENACES THE COUNTRY
Russell Sage, who piled up a colossal fortune in Wall street, always operated individually. He held to the rather old-fashioned notion that corporations were a menace to the business interests of the country. He believed that it was the right of an individual to amass a great fortune, and that this could be done without injury to the country. He saw the possession by any person of vast wealth was but temporary. Death soon caused the distribution and frequently the disappearance of such fortunes, while corporations, growing rich and powerful, gathered wealth that was added to as the years rolled on. In time the great corporations might become more powerful than the government itself. Russell Sage's hard common sense is now apparent to every person who is capable of grasping the big economical problems of the time. For example, Standard Oil has been piling up dividends aggregating \$40,000,000 a year for 10 years past. The corporation has absorbed in that time the principal railroad lines of the country, ocean steamship lines, the copper mines and great financial institutions. With allied corporations like the steel and coal trusts, the handful of men at its head practically control the industries and the finances of the country. They are able to make times good or bad; to dictate legislation and intimidate officials. The country now is feeling the force of the displeasure of the money barons, who are also the corporation magnates.
And there seems little or no hope for future relief. Rockefeller, Rogers, Morgan and Harriman will die in due course of time, but other shrewd men and the great corporations they organized will go right along gathering into their coffers the wealth of the nation.
The time will come when the great mass of the people will unite in the demand for rights not circumscribed by corporate influence—for laws not made in the interest of concentrated wealth. Why not fight the battle now as well as at any other time?

The success of the recent international balloon race and the progress made in the construction and management of dirigible airplanes is stimulating interest in aerial navigation. As yet too many contingencies appear to make such navigation an unqualified success, and in any event it is altogether likely that most people will prefer to travel by methods that do not call for such an overcoming of the law of gravitation. Yet it is rapid by rush to say that Aerial navigation will not ultimately be a great success. So many things have been accomplished that once were declared impossible that it is reasonable to believe that as man has successfully used the atmosphere for communication he will in time successfully use it for transportation.
It was an affectionate greeting that Will Carleton received from his former townsmen when he visited the other day his old home at Hillsdale, Mich., and the tribute was deserved. America has produced greater poets than Carleton, but none has sung himself more fully into the hearts of what is termed the common people. Like James Whitcomb Riley he has voiced in rugged and homely verse their life and experiences, and in so doing has given comfort and delight to thousands. Few poems have been more widely read than "Over the Hills to the Poor House" and "Nancy and I are Out."
