RANKIN'S CREW OF SURVEYORS ARE LAID OFF

FIFTY OR SIXTY MEN AT WORK
ON EASTERN OREGON SURVEY
COMING DOWN

ORDERS RECEIVED TO LAY OFF
WHOLE CREW AND CEASE OPERATIONS—ADVANCE GUARD
ARRIVES IN EUGENE FROM
MOUNTAINS THIS AFTERNOON

Fifteen or sixteen members of the Rankin surveying crew on the Oregon Eastern project in the Cascade mountains in the eastern part of Lane county arrived in Eugene this afternoon, stating that Engineer C. R. Rankin, who is in charge of the crew, had received orders to cease work and lay off all his men. The men who arrived today state that the remainder of the crew of fifty or sixty men will be down within a few days.

The orders received by Engineer Rankin were to cease work altogether and nothing was said about resuming after the financial flurry had passed over, although it is thought work will begin again when construction work, also ordered stopped by the S. P. Co., is resumed.

The Guard published a clipping from a Klamath Falls paper yesterday to the effect that the surveyors were still at work on that end of the line, but it is probable that they, too, have received orders by this time to quit work.

FORGER OF CHECKS IN TOILS OF LAW

Yesterday evening shortly before 6 o'clock a young man went into Roberts Bros. haberdashery and purchasing several dollars' worth of goods, tendering a \$15 check in payment. He was given the change and left the store. The proprietors of the store became suspicious that the check was not good and followed the man to the Hotel Smeede. An examination of the register revealed the fact that he had registered under a different name from that endorsed on the check, Edward Pehrson, the name written on the register by him being Robert J. Dillon.

The check was drawn on the First National bank of Albany, was made out to Edward Pehrson and had the name of John Giblin signed to it. Elmer Roberts telephoned to Giblin, who is the proprietor of the St. Charles hotel at Albany, and learned that he had given no such check. The officers were then notified and Policeman Croner placed the man under arrest. When searched two other checks made out in the same way as the one which was passed on Roberts Bros., and each for \$10, were found on his person.

In the county jail and his examination will be held tomorrow before Justice of the Peace Bryson, the statutes excepting criminal procedure on holidays.

Pehrson or Dillon is aged about 25 years and is well dressed and of good appearance. He stated that he was here to enter the University. The officers are of the opinion that he is an experienced crook.
