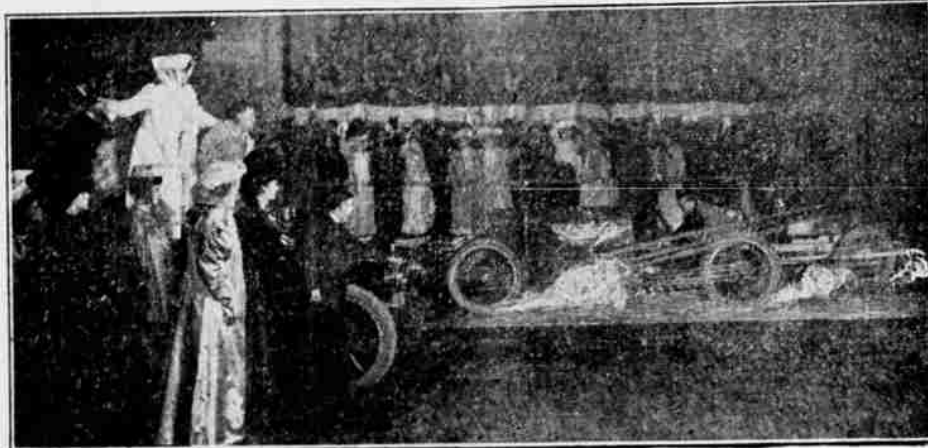

WAITING ON COUNTY COURT FOR MONEY

COUNTY EMPLOYEES AND OTHERS HAVING MONEY COMING FROM COUNTY MUST WAIT

Employees of the county and all those who have money coming to them for work done for the county or for supplies purchased by the county have been crowding the court house asking for their warrants, but one and all have been sent away with the statement that their bills will have to wait until the county court convenes and allows their bills. The reason for the county court not meeting Wednesday, the time set, is because of the legal holidays which have been declared by Governor Chamberlain. According to the law the county court cannot meet and allow bills on a legal holiday and thus the transaction of county business is necessarily delayed until the holiday season is over.

The ones who have money due them from the county, however, are taking the postponement in good part and little complaint is heard. It is believed that the holidays will be declared off within a few days, and that the county court will be able to meet early next week. According to the law the court is compelled to meet immediately after the conclusion of the holidays and transact its business, or otherwise wait over until next month.

When the holidays are over the county court house will be a very busy place, as all the business which is accumulating will have to be attended to. There are now a large number of circuit court cases waiting in the county clerk's office to be filed. Circuit court will also convene on the first day after the holidays, when the adjourned term will convene. The regular term has been set for December 2.

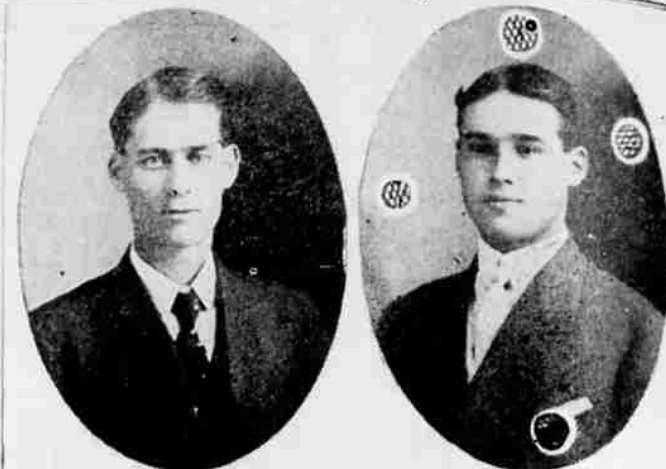
