WHITES REPLACED BY JAPANESE ON S. P. SECTION

CREW OF EIGHT, NEARLY ALL
HEADS OF FAMILIES, LAID OFF
LAST NIGHT

PETITION TO HAVE ORDER RE-
SCINDED WILL BE CIRCULAT-
ED AMONG BUSINESS MEN—
JAPANESE RECEIVE \$1.35 A
DAY WHILE WHITES WERE
GETTING \$1.50

This morning the eight white men
employed on the Southern Pacific
section gang in this city were replaced
by Japanese, the order having
come from headquarters at Portland
on Tuesday of this week. The
whites quit without a murmur, but it
is said that a petition is being circu-
lated among the business men of
the city, asking the company to re-
scind the order and take the whites
back to work.

A majority of the men let out are
heads of families, and this action on
the part of the company without
previous notice will work a hardship
on them. They worked all during
the summer at a low wage when they
could have made much more at some
other kind of work, with the expecta-
tion of having a winter's job. Up to
the first of October they received
\$1.75 a day, but upon that date their
wages were reduced to \$1.50 a
day. There was no great objection
to this reduction, as most of them
figured that they would rather work
at that low wage during the winter
than to be idle perhaps half of the
time if they depended upon other
work for their living.

The Japanese, it is understood, are
being paid \$1.35 a day, and it seems
that the reason for the change is to
cut down the expenses. This is in
line with the general retrenchment
policy that was inaugurated by the
Harriman system at the beginning of
the present financial flurry. The
citizens of the city, almost to a man,
will sign the petition to have the
whites replaced on the section.

PORTLAND MARKET REPORT

Portland, Nov. 14.—Every year
the onion growers of Oregon are used
to pulling burning brands out of the
fire for California producers, manipu-
lators and dealers. Every year the
market is boosted here to stop ship-
ments from the north and south, and
thus allow the California holders to
sell their product at the advanced
prices while the Oregon growers con-
tinue to hold, being confidently told
by the Californians that prices should
and will be higher. This year is no
exception to the rule, and the local
onion men have swallowed the honey-
eyed words of the Californians and
the result is that prices here have
been boosted to such a figure that
it prohibited shipments from here
to the south, and even though there
was a demand at the high values the
prices were boosted to. The higher
the prices were boosted here the
tighter local growers held their pro-
duct, this being the exact game the
southerners were aiming at. With
high prices ruling here and ship-
ments stopped by growers holding it
was an easy matter for the Califor-
nia trade to bring in its supplies and
sell them at handsome profits. It is
understood that several of the larger
onion handlers of California raise a
considerable amount of stock them-
selves, and for this reason it is quite
easy for them to boost the market
here by buying a car or two at wide-
ly scattered sections at advanced
prices.

No Business to South at Present.
Despite all utterances to the con-
trary, there is no new business in
either the potato or onion market
with the south at present. Accord-
ing to mail advices of November 9
the arrivals of both potatoes and on-
ions in San Francisco were very lib-
eral. Within the space of 48 hours
17 cars of potatoes and seven cars

of onions were received by Bay City
merchants and the market is dull and
weak with low prices still the rule.
Even though there were a demand
from the south at this time, the local
trade would not or could not accept
the business because of the monetary
situation. As far as the local trade
in onions and potatoes is concerned,
a fair volume of business is reported.
Onion producers are seeing the south-
ern game quite clearly and are more
in a mood to sell than heretofore.

While all local dealers are of the
opinion that good prices will rule on
onions this season, they say that prices
were boosted too high for this
time of year.
Hop Consignments Are All Wrong.
The principle of hop consignments
is all wrong at every time. This year
in every year when prices are low
the principle is that much worse. It
stands to reason that if there is any
demand for hops and those who re-
ceive consignments can sell them,
there must be a demand for those
that pay cash. In a year when prices
are low the person who receives con-
signments of hops is always willing
to sell at a lower figure than his
competitor, simply because the hops
do not cost him a cent and he gets
his commission, no matter what the
price he obtains. In this way the
values are put down to such a figure
that growers do not obtain a fair
deal. This rule applies more direct-
ly to those who are simply dealers
and do not grow hops. The grower of
hops who sells consignments
has some interest in keeping the mar-
ket up.

Great Scarcity of Veal Continues.
There continues a great scarcity
of dressed veal in the Front street
markets. Receipts are nominal and
prices are high.

Dressed hogs are coming in too
fast and lower prices are ruling in
some instances.

Chicken market, while not show-
ing an improvement in price, looks
better and will do better if shippers
will hold their supplies off for a
while. The market for holiday birds
has not yet opened.

Local eggs are still on the scarce
flat with values holding stiff at 35c.
Eastern rule from 27 to 28c. Cream-
ery better and cheaper steady.

Best Notes of the Trade.
A better trade is shown in the
cheap trade of apples.
Grapes due from the south yester-
day morning came in 24 hours late.
Condition indifferent.

Peach demand is slow, with prices
rather and somewhat lower.
Supplies of fresh salmon in the
Portland market are very small on
account of the short catch. Prices on
fish unchanged.

Portland Livestock Market.
The local livestock market is ma-
terially weaker today and declines of
25 and 50 cents a hundred were gen-

HARRIMAN IS ELIMINATED BY MONEY KINGS

New York, Nov. 13.—The railroad
banking interests' answer to the
country's demand for regulation has
been the formation of the greatest
railroad syndicate and holding com-
pany this country or the world has
ever seen. In the new organization
E. H. Harriman has been given a mi-
nor part, and the principal actors are
J. P. Morgan, J. J. Hill, Kuhn Loeb
& Co., John D. Rockefeller and the
Standard Oil Company, which today
control every transcontinental rail-
road, including the Union Pacific
and Southern Pacific. The first ap-
parent result will be the immediate
restoration of normal financial con-
ditions.

Only piecemeal thus far have the
facts leaked out regarding the great
game that has been played in rail-
road finance. Roundly stated, it has
been a coup in which practically all
the great railroad systems have fal-
len into the basket of a compara-
tively small group of the country's
big financiers, principal among
whom are Rockefeller, Morgan, Hill,
Kuhn-Loeb and the Standard Oil
group. They have bought great
bundles of stocks in railroads that
they never had hoped to secure at
the prices that prevailed for a few
brief hours.

lowing railroads, steamship lines and
large industrial:

In fact, the only great trans-con-
tinental railway systems left out of
the consolidation is the Gould rail-
roads, and these will drop into the
lap of this gigantic combination be-
fore long, because it will squeeze the
life out of Gould by making it impos-
sible for him to get more money.

Harriman Eliminated.

The elimination of Mr. Harriman
became a necessity, but it was prac-
tically impossible of accomplishment
so long as the prosperous times con-
tinued. It was impossible by reason
of Mr. Harriman's faculty for mak-
ing railroads, and particularly the
Union Pacific and Southern Pacific
groups, profitable to their stockhold-
ers. Never in the history of Ameri-
can railroads have transcontinental
lines been so enormously profitable
to their operators as have these sys-
tems under Harriman's direction. To
dislodge him from a position so
strongly entrenched would have been
beyond the power of even the great-
est financiers without the accom-
plishment of the semi-panic that has
prevailed in Wall street for the past
three weeks. This period offered
the opportunity that was taken ad-
vantage of by the Morgan-Rockefel-
ler-Kuhn-Loeb organization, which
was providentially assisted by the
secretary of the treasury, who came
into New York one critical day with
\$20,000,000 of government money
and unknowingly but very materially
aided the syndicate in its operations.
