BRYAN TALKS ON FINANCES TO DEMOCRATS

Lafayette, Ind., Nov. 18.—William J. Bryan received an enthusiastic welcome when he addressed the members of the Jackson Club, a local Democratic organization, at their banquet tonight. Seven hundred plates were provided for, of which 45 were at the table at which the distinguished Nebraskan sat. In addition 2500 others were present.

Mr. Bryan said that, after serving in two campaigns, he did not feel like volunteering again, although he would accept the presidential nomination in 1908, "if drafted."

He said he was glad that the unprecedented discovery of gold had taken the money question out of politics.

Vindicated by the Almighty.
"But I want it known," said the

speaker, "that our arguments on the money question advanced in 1896 have been vindicated, not by the Republican party, but because God Almighty took pity on the poor people of the world and opened up to them vast storehouses of gold."

Mr. Bryan denounced tariff revision as proposed by the Republicans, and accused the Republican party of bad faith in promising revision. "The delay of a single year means much to the people of the country, and they are being defrauded out of hundreds of millions of dollars in the meantime. The people are ready to let the Democrats reform the tariff," asserted Mr. Bryan.

If He Were President.
The speaker declared that President Roosevelt should not be held responsible for the present financial stringency. Mr. Bryan places the blame on the Wall street gamblers. Mr. Bryan expressed himself as in favor of the postal savings bank and he said he believed it would be a better plan than asset currency. He said:

"We are in the midst of a financial stringency that is in some respects more acute than that of 1893. I am not going to blame the president or a Republican administration but I know who would be blamed if I were president. If I were president I would cross roads. The panic of 1873 came twelve years after the Republicans took power, and eleven years before they surrendered power to the Democrats. I am not going to blame the president, because I don't think blame should be laid at his door. I am going to do him the justice to say I won't join in the chorus of Eastern financiers who want to make him the scapegoat. Those who violate the law should be blamed, not those who have turned on the light recently."

Wall Street the Cause.
"There is no excuse for the people being afraid that their banks are not solvent. What is the cause of this panic? The President is not to blame. Who is to blame? The Republican leaders who had control of the country for 47 years. They have so chained us to Wall street that, when a Wall street gambler fails, our business world trembles all over the country."

"The common people and not the Wall street gamblers should handle the situation. The man who will draw out his money now, when he does not need it, is in the same class as the man who would refuse to aid his country in time of war. This is a time when great patriotism is needed."

BARTHOLDT WANTS BIG BOUND ISSUE FOR WATERWAYS

Washington, Nov. 19.—Representative Bartholdt, of Missouri, after a talk with President Roosevelt today, announced his intention of introducing a bill as soon as congress meets to give legal status to the inland waterways commission, which was created by executive act, and another bill providing for a \$500,000,000 bond issue to establish a fund for permanent great waterway improvements, leaving the smaller projects to be taken care of in the regular river and harbor bills.

Cut Out Political Pull.
It is proposed to have the waterway commission a permanent body, which shall employ experts and keep congress officially advised as to the merits of waterway projects. Mr. Bartholdt says the president regards

the plan with favor. To a large extent the proposed permanent commission would relieve the river and harbor committee of investigating work, and, it is declared, prevent favoritism and political pull from providing for unmeritorious projects.
