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## BROWN'S SLAYER FINISHES STORY ON WITNESS STAND

Washington, Nov. 21.—Mrs. Bradley was quite composed and evidently prepared to continue her testimony when she entered the courtroom today. District Attorney Baker continued his cross-examination. She told of being arrested three times with Broyn on the charge of adultery. She said Brown was addicted to the use of liquor and they frequently quarreled, and on one occasion she struck Brown in the mouth with an umbrella, knocking some teeth out. Questioned as to Brown being jealous of her, several names were mentioned as being involved, one of whom was designated as "the priest." She repeated names in a letter to the senator and added: "Let us forget them and slip life's nectar from each other."

Asked what she meant by the expression, witness said it was not necessary to explain. Mrs. Bradley did not want to say who was meant by the priest, but finally said Brown always insisted on calling Dr. Utter, her pastor, "the priest." She declared there was no foundation for Brown's jealousy.

Extracts of letters from Mrs. Bradley to Senator Brown were read in which the names of Schroeders, Evans, McQuire and "the priest" were mentioned. Mrs. Bradley declared Brown's jealousy of these men was not justified. She said she knew them, but was astonished that their names had been referred to.

Mrs. Bradley's cross-examination was concluded at 11:12 o'clock. It is evident the letters passing between Brown and Mrs. Bradley will form an important part of the testimony against her on the charge of murdering Brown.

The letters are couched in the most endearing terms. Some evince

Brown's jealousy of Mrs. Bradley, while she was a guest at the Angels hotel, Los Angeles. In his letters to Mrs. Bradley Brown used such expressions as "Dolly," "Sweetheart," "Love," "Beloved," "Dear Heart," "Angel," "Darling," "Wife" and "L. M. J." (Little Mint Julep), the meaning of these initials having been developed yesterday.

Major Samuel A. King and Colonel M. M. Kalign, attorneys of Salt Lake, testified that they interviewed Mrs. Bradley in 1902 with a view to arranging a compromise with a money consideration, but she refused to do so.

Dr. Whitney testified that Senator Brown came to him regarding the treatment to be given Mrs. Bradley in consequence of criminal operations performed upon her.

## NEW STEAMER FAILS FOR RECORD

New York, Nov. 21.—A wireless dispatch from the Mauretania indicates that the steamer will arrive at Sandy Hook at daybreak Friday, 7 hours behind the record of the Lusitania. The Mauretania encountered a fierce storm, necessitating a reduced rate of speed.

## SENSATIONAL MURDER TRIAL BEGINS AT BUTTE

Helena, Nov. 21.—George Melville was placed on trial in the district court today charged with killing Winfield Guthrie. The defense is that the killing was done because of abuse of Mrs. Melville.

Melville and wife were chief actors in a celebrated bigamy case at Butte two years ago, being in jail simultaneously on that charge. Mrs. Melville testified against her former husband for the murder of her father, her husband receiving a sentence of life imprisonment. Although the young woman had been married three times the prosecution will endeavor to prove the deed was done because of jealousy.

## WOMAN KILLED HERSELF AND SONS

Newton, Mass., Nov. 21.—Mrs. William T. Hedges killed herself and two sons, aged 11 and 6, by asphyxiation at her home in Newtonville during last night. All the cracks in the doors and windows were plugged up and the gas turned on.

## HEARST MUST ANSWER TO CRIMINAL CHARGES

New York, Nov. 21.—Justice Wyant, of the court of special sessions, today held William R. Hearst for the grand jury on the charge of criminal libel, preferred by William Astor Chanler.

S. S. Carvalho appeared for Hearst.

The charge is based on the publication in the Hearst papers of a story to the effect that Chanler was implicated in the alleged scandalous and criminal acts of Actor Hitchcock, who is under indictment for mistreating young girls.

## FORAKER IS ENDORSED IN TAFT'S OWN STATE

OPPOSITION OF ADMINISTRATION POLICIES GAINS DECISIVE VICTORY OVER TAFT MEN—STATE LEAGUE OF REPUBLICAN CLUBS EXPRESS LOYALTY TO HIS PRESIDENTIAL ASPIRATIONS

Columbus, O., Nov. 20.—United States Senator J. B. Foraker, of Ohio, was today endorsed for re-election to the senate and for the Republican nomination for president at a joint meeting of the executive and advisory committees of the Ohio League of Republican Clubs at a meeting held in this city. The committees also declare that they have no sympathy "whatever with the proposition that has been advanced that Senator Foraker be eliminated or retired from public life because he was not able to agree with the president as to the rate bill or joint statehood for New Mexico and Arizona, nor about the Brownsville matter."

The action of the joint committees at once brought out a challenge from A. J. Noyes, manager of the Taft presidential canvass, for a popular primary to determine the choice of the Ohio Republicans of a candidate for president.

The meeting of the joint committees of the Ohio Republican League was held this afternoon. About 5000 ardent supporters of Mr. Foraker, members of the committees or holding proxies, were in attendance.

## MRS. ROMADTKA GOES TO PRISON

Chicago, Nov. 21.—Mrs. Evelyn Romadtka, a wealthy Milwaukee woman who confessed to various burglaries and larcenies in this city, in which a negro man was her accomplice, was today taken to the state penitentiary at Joliet to serve a sentence of from one to twenty years' imprisonment.

## FAMILY CREMATED IN THEIR HOME

Marletta, Nov. 21.—Edgar Grubb, his wife and baby were cremated in their home at Beverly today. It is rumored that the family met death by foul play, and that their home was fired to cover the crime.

## POWERS WINS POINT IN TRIAL FOR HIS LIFE

Georgetown, Nov. 21.—The defense in the Caleb Powers trial today renewed its motion to have Jas. Howard, now serving a life sentence in the penitentiary, brought here to consult with Powers and his attorneys. Over the objection of the commonwealth's attorneys, Judge Morris granted an order for Howard to be brought from the Frankfort penitentiary and placed in jail with Powers, where they will have ample opportunity to consult.

Later in the trial Howard will testify for Powers.

Yesterday the trial judge dismissed the special venire of jurymen on the ground that the officials who summoned them were prejudiced against the defendant.

## MRS. HARTJE WON COMPLETE COURT VICTORY

Philadelphia, Nov. 21.—Mrs. Mary Scott Hartje won a complete victory in the Pennsylvania superior court today when that tribunal affirmed the decision of the Allegheny court which refused Hartje a divorce.

## UNEARTH FRAUDS IN THE SALE OF KICKAPOO LANDS

Oklahoma City, Nov. 21.—Much fraud is reported to have been unearthed in the investigation of the charges of fraud in the sale of the Kickapoo Indian lands. Senators Curtis and Teller passed through the city today on their way to Washington, where the investigation will be completed. Curtis, who heretofore favored the removal of the restrictions from the lands, since taking part in the investigation announces he will oppose it in the senate.

## IN DEFENSE OF JOHN R. WALSH

Chicago, Nov. 21.—Attorney Miller, for the defense, continued today the cross-examination of Bank Examiner Moxey in the trial of John R. Walsh. His first inquiries related to the sale of other bonds than those used as collateral for the various memorandum notes mentioned in Moxey's direct examination. It was shown by the defense that these bonds had been sold to the public at prices equal to those received for them from the Chicago National Bank.
