CELEBRATIONS THAT ARE VERY COSTLY

There was a great event to celebrate in the Jamestown exposition, but it might have been fittingly observed in a day's ceremonies, with an outright expenditure of a few thousand dollars and no risks taken. It was on the chance of booming the surrounding country that an exposition was planned. That is, speculation was added to the celebration and the returns are liabilities of \$2,000,000 and assets of less than \$1,000,000. It is proposed to beg off on a government loan, and even with the unpaid part of this loan canceled there would not be funds available to satisfy bondholders and others, to say nothing of the capital stock.

As the stockholders were residents of Virginia cities to which visitors were drawn by the celebration, it is probable that some of them have realized indirectly on their investments, but the attendance at Norfolk up to the present time has been only 1,272,000. For comparison here is: Chicago, 27,540,000; St. Louis, 18,741,000; Buffalo, 8,295,000; Portland, 2,545,000. The larger the city the larger the attendance. This is a practical consideration which the promoters of expositions are too apt to ignore, or to slight if it seems to count against them. At Norfolk the thought was that the imposing water display and the historical attraction of the country would add so much to the interest of the exposition proper that the combined inducements would prove irresistible. Reference was made also to the great population within a radius of so many hundred miles. But deeply interesting though the outside attractions are, it is the population within a radius of fifty or twenty-five miles that gives to expositions their indispensable support.

We wish all exposition cities well, but in view of the fact that expositions have been coming very fast since the World's Fair, and that the supply of historic events is inexhaustible, it would be well for the promoters of future expositions to ponder over the returns and possibly to compromise on a procession and a set oration, with added remarks by prominent citizens.

Attention has been called to the refusal of postoffices to accept the certificates. The clearing house certificate is not national currency, and, therefore, is not accepted by federal institutions. For the same reason the certificate is not accepted in the payment of taxes. This by no means discounts their value. Neither postoffices nor tax collectors will accept diamonds, gold nuggets or houses and lots for tax payments, yet this does not affect their value. They are unquestioned mediums of private exchange. No one would hesitate to accept the certificates. They are taken so much as a matter of course by merchants and other business concerns that they may be safely offered freely and without fear of rebuff.

Except for the use of clearing house certificates in Eugene banks are doing business on a practically normal basis, and there is every evidence that the financial stringency is rapidly passing without leaving any permanent effects upon the prosperity of the country. The Guard firmly believes that next spring will see the beginning of the most rapid growth in population and business that Eugene ever experienced. People are coming here every day to make their homes and every new family adds to the business volume of the country.

After all William J. Bryan has a way of saying the right thing in the right place, and patriotism is the keynote of all his utterances. In a recent speech he said: "There is no savior for the people being afraid that the banks are not solvent. The man who will draw out his money now, when he does not need it, is in the same class as the man who would refuse to add his country in time of war. What of the Financial Future?

THE REAL QUESTION THAT TROUBLES US IS, WHAT OF THE FUTURE? AND HERE I AM INCLINED TO BE OPTIMISTIC; NOT THAT I THINK FOR AN INSTANT THAT THE RATE OF INCREASE FOR THE PAST FIVE YEARS CAN GO ON FOR THE NEXT FIVE YEARS; NEITHER SHOULD WE WISH IT.

Then we must put in force ECONOMIES that will enable the people to save and invest their surplus so as to absorb the large amount of short term notes that have been put out. We must remember that they have all been sold. It is only a question of placing them in the form of a PERMANENT INVESTMENT and not providing new funds.

The banks should set their face against loans for speculation or for promotion of enterprises. LET THE NEW DEVELOPMENTS WAIT A LITTLE. Let the business people learn that the extravagance and wild speculation of the last year or two must stop and economy must be the rule.
