WORK RUSHED ON RAILROAD TO KLAMATH

Klamath Falls, Nov. 23.—The construction of the California Northern Railway has assumed much more prominence with the contractors during the past few days than it ever possessed before. Now they are getting their forces in shape to push the work right along. Monday evening Archie Mason and C. W. Miller, of the Mason Construction Company, arrived from Portland for the purpose of pushing the work of building the grade through the marshes, while Erickson & Peterson the now transferring some of the equipment that was in use on the work that has been closed down to the work out from Bray. Archie Mason is to remain here for a time and get the two dredgers in operation as soon as possible. They will be operated night and day, as planned when the contract was first let, but which has been delayed for one cause or another.

It is the expressed opinion of the officials in charge that the work will progress much faster than formerly, and that there will be no delay in completing the road to this city. But they are like the rest of us and put in a saving clause to the effect that if the financial situation does not cause a cessation of work, etc. However, up to the present time the Southern Pacific Company has not intimated that there would be any delay in the work, and as the contractors are making preparations to push the work the outlook is very favorable.

NEWS OF LOWER SIUSLAW COUNTRY

The school in Mercer Lake district opened this week with Miss Grace Smith in charge.

The steamer Roscoe arrived here Monday from the Umpqua. She left Coos Bay Saturday morning but was too late to reach the Siuslaw while the tide was rising, so put in at the Umpqua.

Last week we mentioned an apple grown by John L. Furnish that measured 14 1-2 inches in circumference. A few days ago we received an apple from Charles Anderson of Point Torrance that measured 15 1-2 inches in circumference. Who can beat that?

There is likely to be some delay with the work on the government telephone line to the Umpqua. It appears that a large part of the poles furnished by the contractors were not up to the specifications and nearly the whole lot was rejected by the inspector. It will take some time before other poles can be obtained and delivered on the ground.—Florence West.

OLD ORCHARDS RESTORED IN WILLAMETTE VALLEY

George T. Frost's orchard is one that is in process of restoration. Mr. Frost is a pioneer of 1852, says the Seio News. His orchard was put in in 1857. For a number of years it produced as good fruit as can be grown in either Hood or Rogue river valleys. He, like every one else, because of the lack of market for apples, allowed his orchard to deteriorate so that what few apples were grown were fit only for hog feed. Three years ago Mr. Frost commenced putting his fruit trees in condition. Now they are growing fruit equal to the best that we have seen that came from Hood River. His Bellflowers and Baldwins are simply perfect. We know, for he sent us a sample. What he has accomplished with his old orchard can be accomplished with nearly all of our old orchards.

AMUSEMENTS

At the Eugene theatre Saturday night "The Alaskan" scored the greatest success of the season in the line of music comedy offerings. It was something new, entirely out of the beaten paths, and the stage settings were beautiful and novel. The Totem pole song of course got half a dozen encores, the words are good enough and the tune is well fitted, of the sort that stays. A dozen of the chorus men, smothered in grotesque totem poles, came teetering in and form an unique background, while Edward Martindell's sonorous bass voice rolls out on the air.

The two principal comedians, Teddy Webb and Harold Vizard, were decided hits. Webb's ruffled, barrel-like personality is well fitted in the part of a strolling theatrical manager. He has lots of good lines and works out a lot of really funny business, some of it rather reminiscent of a chestnut forest, but all of it funny. Vizard is at home as a fossil hunting old professor. In a song and dance with William Fables, the Teddy Bear, Webb gets many breathless encores and Fables is appropriate as the gigantic bear galumphing about the stage. Edward Martindell has a stunning voice and uses it well. Harry Girard, the composer, takes the juvenile part. He has a pleasing baritone voice, which makes his musical numbers go well, and he is a handsome devil with a shameless wink that ought to make a hit with feminine audiences. Agnes Cain Brown is a dainty little girl with cunning mannerisms, but they are not quite enough to make up for her lack of voice. The chorus is one of the prettiest that has been seen here for a long time. The production altogether bears all the marks of care and no stint of money. The costumes, stage settings and features are all appropriate. The Eskimo number, when half the chorus is clad in white furs and white fur jackets, makes a very pretty picture and the dancing is graceful.

Maude Fealy, one of the youngest and most talented of the younger generation of stage favorites, is to be the attraction at the Eugene theatre tonight, when she is to be seen in the great London success, "The Stronger Sex."
