FOUR HUNDRED PEOPLE WENT TO PORTLAND TODAY

BIG EXCURSION OF STUDENTS AND TOWNSPEOPLE TO SEE FOOTBALL GAME

EUGENE RESIDENTS WEAR BADGES WITH NAME OF CITY PRINTED ON THEM AND WILL BOOST FOR EUGENE AS WELL AS FOR GAME

Nearly 400 students and townspeople went to Portland on the noon train today to see the big football game between the University of Oregon and Multnomah Club teams. Two hundred tickets were sold to the students alone, and the remainder to the townspeople, who all wore Eugene badges and will boost for the city as well as for the football team. This is the largest crowd that ever went to Portland from here to see the annual Thanksgiving game, and shows the enthusiasm of the people of Eugene over the game and the local team. Four coaches were set aside here last night for the excursionists, but they were filled long before the train arrived and perhaps a hundred had to stand up in the cars, and will probably have to all the way down to Portland.
