STREET CARS RUN EVERY 15 MINUTES

PASSING TRACK IS BEING INSTALLED AND PASSENGERS ARE NOW TRANSFERRED

While the passing track is being built on East Eleventh street, between Ferry and Mill, the passengers on the street cars are being transferred there, one car operating between the end of the track and the passing track, while the other operates between there and the S. P. depot, thus giving a fifteen-minute service, which will be continued after the track is completed. Heretofore both cars have made the trip each way only once every half hour.

New Generator.
A large generator arrived here for the company this morning and will be installed at the transferring station at the company's office on Willamette street. It weighs nearly five tons and there will be considerable trouble to move it from the car. This will be the second generator in use at this station, one of them being held in reserve all the time.

O. A. C. DEFEATED LOS ANGELES TEAM

Los Angeles, Nov. 28.—The football eleven of the Oregon Agricultural College today won the championship by defeating St. Vincent's college by a score of 10 to 0. A touchdown and a goal from the 30-yard line in the first fifteen minutes of play accounted for Oregon's success.

In the second half the St. Vincent's outplayed their opponents, but were unable to score. In this half Oregon secured the ball on St. Vincent's twenty-yard line, but were unable to buck their way across the goal. Oregon generally had the best of the line playing, St. Vincent's being unable to make consistent gains through the line. Most of their gains were made on forward passes, quarterback kicks and an occasional end run.

IDAHO AND U. OF W. PLAY THE GAME

Seattle, Wash., Nov. 28.—Idaho and Washington fought to a standstill this afternoon, neither eleven being able to score. Idaho had the best during the first half, puzzling Washington by their style of play. The Washington's tackling was miserable, and Idaho made substantial gains time and again after shaking off the purple and gold warriors.

In the second half the ball was in Idaho's territory most of the time, but Washington was unable to push the ball over the chalk line for a touchdown. Grimm, of Washington, made three attempts at field goals, but all were failures. Small starred for the visiting team, while Grimm put up the best game for Washington.

FAINTS UNDER LASH.

Wife Beater Whipped at Post in Portland, Ore.

WITH A CAT O' NINE TAILS.

Deputy Sheriff Wields Weapon Lustily on Brutal Husband's Bared Back Until Victim's Howls Are Heard Throughout the Jail.

Fifteen lashes across the back with a cat o' nine tails at the whipping post was the punishment inflicted on Henry Shaefer of Portland, Ore., for beating his wife on the streets.

Shaefer fell in a faint when the handcuffs were taken off, but revived soon after and shook hands with Deputy Sheriff Frank Beatty, who had wielded the whip.

Shaefer was arrested and soon after ward pleaded not guilty to the charge of assault and battery. Before Judge Cleland in the district court he changed his plea to guilty and asked the leniency of the court. Deputy District Attorney Moser in recommending the whipping post as Shaefer's punishment said:

"This man has been guilty of repeated assaults upon his wife. On one occasion he stripped her, tied her fast to a chair and beat her with a strap. When the wife's sister intervened on her behalf he beat the sister also."

"I have never inflicted this sentence before," said the judge, "but in this case I feel it to be just. The judgment of the court is that you receive fifteen lashes at the hands of the sheriff or his deputy."

Shaefer was led from the courtroom to the jail, and the preparation for the execution of the sentence was carried on without returning Shaefer to the cell. Before he went up to the courtroom Shaefer told his cell mates that if he were whipped he would not flinch.

The wife beater was stripped to the waist and his hands fastened by handcuffs to the bars of the cell. The whip, a rawhide about two feet long with six lashes about eighteen inches long at the end, had not fallen the third time before Shaefer's determination not to flinch was forgotten, and his cries could be heard all over the jail.

The whipping took place in the presence of Sheriff Stevens, Deputy Sheriff Bulger and Deputy District Attorney

Gus C. Moser and H. B. Adams. When the fifteenth lash had been struck and the handcuffs were taken off Shaefer's wrists he sank into a chair fainting. Salve and soothing liniments were applied to Shaefer's back, and while the wounds were dressed he stretched his wrists, where the handcuffs had cut into them, and said:

"Look at those hands. In the old country black bread and work in the fields is good enough for a woman, but here they make a goddess of her. I have worked eight years with these hands for that woman. Now look at them, and it was she who brought it about."

Killed by a Dinner Bell.

Mrs. James Lawrence recently met death at her home near Waynesfield, O., in a most unusual manner. She went to the yard where the bell hung to ring the call for dinner for her husband and son working in the fields, and while she was ringing it the bell broke loose from its fastenings, fell on her head and killed her instantly. The husband and son found her dead form in the yard when they answered the bell in about ten minutes, and it was discovered that her neck was broken.
