PRES. CAMPBELL

THREW HAT AWAY

CASTS HIS SKYPIECE TO THE
WINDS IN ENTHUSIASM OVER
FOOTBALL VICTORIES

President P. L. Campbell, of the
Oregon State University, has thrown
his hat away. He took it off yes-
terday to the eleven of his own great
school when they recorded their sec-
ond consecutive victory over Multno-
mah, for years masters of the Pacific
Northwest gridiron. A few hours later
came the news from Los Angeles
that the Oregon Agricultural Col-
lege had beaten St. Vincent's, the
champion college team of the Pacific
coast. It was then that President
Campbell grabbed his headpiece and
threw it as far as he could.

Reasons for his appreciation will
be fully understood by all who heard
a certain address made by President
Campbell recently before the Port-
land Commercial Club, at its "Uni-
versity dinner." He spoke of the Ore-
gon atmosphere, and its powerful in-
fluence in the building of the phys-
ical man. Yesterday the football
teams of Oregon colleges verified his
words. Hence his enthusiastic ap-
preciation.

In substance he said that Oregon
has ideal conditions not only for the
production of fruits and grains, but
for raising the best specimens of
physical manhood; that there is in
Oregon an atmosphere that nurtures
not only intellectual strength, but
great physical powers.

He cited as an example of Oregon
progress the many students who had
gone from Oregon colleges to the
great schools of other states and
made their mark in athletics.

Oregon men almost invariably take
high rank in physical as well as men-
tal contests everywhere. President
Campbell's theory is that there is an
elixir in the air and food and that
the outdoor life so largely prevalent
among Oregon boys and young men
builds up the highest types of phi-
sique. His bold declarations on this
subject at the Commercial Club din-
ner have been fully borne out this
week if prowess on the gridiron
counts for evidence.—Portland Jour-
nal.
