VETERINARY SURGEONS MUST GET CERTIFICATES

The state law regarding the examination of veterinary surgeons, which has been practically in abeyance since it was passed a number of years ago, is to be strictly enforced by the state board of veterinary examiners appointed by Governor Chamberlain about three months ago, according to statements of members of the board. The state law provides that certificates shall be granted to all applicants who can show certificates of graduation from any recognized college in veterinary surgery, upon the payment of a \$5 fee, or that examination may be given by the board the same as one which would be required to obtain a diploma from any recognized veterinary college. The board also has the privilege of granting a non-graduate certificate to applicants who are working in a district where they do not compete with the graduate surgeons.
