AGED HUNTER'S FINE SHOTS WITHOUT GLASSES

T. H. McLANE, OF HAZEL DELL,
82 YEARS OLD, KILLS COUGAR
AND DEER WITHOUT USE OF
GLASSES.

T. H. McLane, a pioneer of 1871, residing at Hazel Dell, and aged 82 years on the 15th day of July last, had quite a cougar hunt a few days ago, and the account of it will be interesting to his many friends. McLane had missed several of his hogs and suspecting that some varmint had been making away with them, he took his dog and rifle and started on a hunt. In less than 30 minutes he heard his dog barking and made his way to the place where the dog had a cougar up in a tree about 50 feet from the ground. The old gentleman took steady aim and the first shot brought the animal to the ground. The aim was excellent and was made without the use of glasses. The cougar measured nine feet from tip to tip.

One day in September McLane, while standing on the porch of his home, saw a deer. He got down his rifle and took one shot and the deer jumped out of sight. He went to see if he had hit it and when he reached the spot where the animal stood he found its dead body not forty feet away. The bullet had pierced its heart.

This was another remarkable shot made without glasses, the deer being 150 yards away. He used the Lyman sight on his 38-40 Winchester rifle. The deer had four points on each horn and weighed, dressed, 135 pounds.

Mr. McLane is hale and hearty despite his advanced age, and can see to shoot as well as many men 30 or 40 years younger, as evidenced by the excellent shots mentioned in this article without the use of glasses.

loads daily at Omaha for like renewal.

Work will also begin December 15 on the opening of the new quarry to supply rock to ballast the main line of the system, in which work over \$1,000,000 is to be spent immediately.

The Union Pacific has placed the eleventh order with the Pittsburgh Pressed Steel Company for 1500 cars to be delivered as soon as possible, and another with the Baldwin locomotive works for 25 locomotives to be delivered within one year.

Work will commence next Monday on the construction of a ten-mile branch road from Kemmerer, Wyoming, to the new coal fields, expected to yield 3000 tons of coal a day. The entire system is resuming construction work.

Rio Janeiro, Dec. 6.—The Brazilian coasting steamer Guasca has gone down off Paranaqua, Brazil, as the result of a collision with an unknown vessel. Thirty people were drowned.
