BOOTH-KELLY CO. WILL PAY CASH TO EMPLOYEES

TWENTY THOUSAND DOLLARS RECEIVED FROM SAN FRANCISCO FOR PAY DAY

COIN IS NOW IN EUGENE LOAN & SAVINGS BANK AND WILL BE DISTRIBUTED AMONG COMPANY'S MILL MEN AND LOGGERS NEXT TUESDAY

The employees of the Booth-Kelly Lumber Company will receive their month's pay next Tuesday in cash, the money having arrived here from San Francisco a day or two ago, and is now in the Eugene Loan & Savings Bank. At the last pay day, it will be remembered, the employees of the company were paid in San Francisco clearing house certificates, the first to be circulated here. They were sent from San Francisco in lieu of the cash, which was not available from the bank in which the company kept its funds in San Francisco.

While the payroll this month is only half as large as usual, nearly \$20,000 will be distributed among the company's men at the mills and in the logging camps.

Being able to secure that amount of cash is a splendid indication that the financial situation is much improved in California, as well as here. The company will hereafter pay its employees in cash every month.

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EIGHTY BODIES REMOVED FROM WRECKED MINES

Monongah, Dec. 7.—Up to 11 a. m. today sixteen bodies had been removed from mines 6 and 8, four of them Americans. The rescuers at this time are within fifteen hundred feet of the end of the mine, working two parties of thirty each with reliefs hourly.

President Watson said today that every possible investigation would be made into the disaster, concerning the cause and fixing the responsibility.

Monongah, W. Va., Dec. 8.—That not less than 100 miners were killed by an explosion of black dam in mines No. 6 and No. 8 of the Consolidated Coal Company, of Baltimore, at this place today, is now conceded by those who take the most hopeful and most conservative view of the disaster. Five badly injured men made their way to the surface.

Of the victims six dead bodies had been taken from mine No. 6 at midnight, and 65 others were piled up in the entry, awaiting facilities for bringing them to the surface. From mine No. 8 at the same hour, 14 bodies had been removed and a number of others are ready to be brought out as soon as arrangements can be completed.

MRS. WYNEGAR'S WILL FILLED FOR PROBATE

A petition for the appointment of L. R. Edmondson, of this city, as administrator of the estate of Mrs. Florence Wynegar, who died at Rochester, Minn., August 23, 1907, but formerly living in Eugene, was filed in the probate court today by L. M. Travis. Mrs. Wynegar left a farm of 270 acres in Lane county. In her will, which is a very lengthy document and which was filed with the petition, among other bequests is one of \$10 to Rev. Ora C. Wright, pastor of the Baptist church of Eugene. Other bequests are to other ministers, educational institutions, etc., besides to numerous relatives.

STILL THRESHING AT ALBERTA CANADA

S. Y. Evans, who has been representing A. C. Ruby & Co., horse importers, in Alberta, Canada, for the past two years, has returned to remain a few months. He reports farmers still threshing in that country, and will not finish before Christmas. Crops are turning out fine, some wheat going as high as 60 and 70 bushels to the acre.

GENERAL FINANCIAL IMPROVEMENT NOTED

New York, Dec. 6.—Broadstreet's tomorrow will say: Improvement is largely confined to financial matters, notable in this respect being the increased ease in call money, some lifting of the embargo on time loans, advancing prices of both bonds and stocks, and a lowering of the premium after a sudden advance due to "window-dressing" necessities on the part of some banks.

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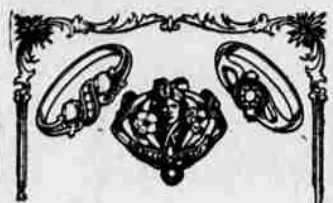

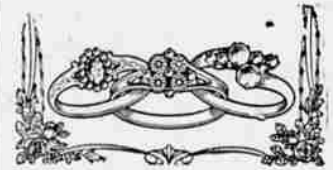
