CREW AT SPRINGFIELD MILL AGAIN REDUCED.—PLANING MILL ACCIDENT

Tuesday was pay day at the Booth-Kelly mill and \$20,000 in gold coin was distributed among our citizens. Last month the company paid off their help with San Francisco clearing house certificates, but this month were fortunate enough in getting the gold from their bankers in California. As the crew at the mill has been considerably reduced during the past week, the payroll will be correspondingly smaller next month, which will no doubt be felt in all lines of business, but as there seems to be a demand for labor in other branches most of the boys that have been let out have found other employment.

Mr. Pitts, one of the proprietors of the Springfield planing mill, received a very serious and painful injury last Saturday forenoon while running one of the saws at the mill. He was sawing a board when in some manner his left hand came in contact with the saw, and as a result he came near losing his hand. The thumb and fingers were badly mangled, and it was thought for a time that it might be necessary to amputate the thumb, but it is now getting along as well as could be expected, and the entire hand will be saved, though he will be unable to use it for several months.—News.

MISS BONNIE BAKER WINS SILVER MEDAL

SUCCESSFUL CANDIDATE AT SILVER MEDAL CONTEST AT THE BAPTIST CHURCH

A very successful W. C. T. U. silver medal contest was held last night at the Baptist church. A fair-sized audience, weather conditions considered, greeted a fine class of seven contestants. Miss Bonnie Baker won the medal, but several others did so well that the audience was unable to guess until the decision was announced who would come out ahead. Professors Duffin and DeCon and Mrs. Meador were the judges. Vivian Kelles and Mrs. Callison each sang a solo beautifully.

one wishes, "The Holy City" is one of the best productions that has come to this city in months. Historically it is correct in scenery and costume, and follows almost literally the story as told in the Bible. Artistically there is not a poor player in the piece.

The best work is done by Luella Morey as Salome, the Cleopatra like daughter of Herod. Keenly intelligent, subtle in the snakelike ways of the Oriental, she looks, acts and thinks the part to perfection. Walter Shermans, John the Baptist and his Judas are in striking contrast, for he plays these two parts equally well. The remainder of the cast played their parts with finished skill, and their costumes were perfect.

No living character represented the Nazarene. His presence was indicated by a flood of light from the wings, and in two cases by reproductions of the masterpieces of Michael Angelo. The music throughout was in keeping with the spirit of the play. If all the churches were as historically correct, as intensely dramatic and as true and reverent in spirit as is "The Holy City," there would be fewer empty pews and a wider knowledge of the Bible and a truer application of its teachings.

This excellent production will be given at the Eugene theatre Friday, December 20. The reserves seat sale opens Tuesday morning at the usual place.
