Boise, Dec. 18.—The continued illness of Clarence Darrow may cause a delay in the Pettibone trial. This announcement was made by Edgar Wilson, of the counsel for the defense, when the trial was resumed this morning. The prosecution began the day's proceedings by the introduction of articles from the Miner's Magazine, the official organ of the Western Federation of Miners, both at the time of the trouble in the Coeur d'Alene and before and after the death of Former Governor Steunenberg.
