Sunday afternoon the University of Oregon athletic council met and transacted such business as related to the athletics of the university. Manager Kestley's football report was accepted. This report shows that football netted the university \$1474.99 this year. A hundred dollars of this will be taken to buy sweaters for members of the team. This money includes the \$1000 in the Title Guarantee & Trust Co. in Portland.

Ralph McEwen was selected manager of football for 1907. McEwen was a junior in civil engineering and is registered from Athena, Or. He is a member of the Sigma Nu fraternity and this year was assistant football manager.

The question of next year's coach for football was discussed, but nothing definite was decided.

Manager Bean's track team schedule and report was accepted. The following is the track team schedule.
