AMUSEMENTS

A good-sized audience witnessed "The Holy City" at the Eugene theatre. The play is all right, if you like to see subjects of this kind, brought down to the level of the stage—something that most of us take little stock in. Besides, the class of actors who play in such dramas are little better, as a rule, than those relied upon to keep the "Uncle Tom's Cabin" burlesque from resting quietly in a peaceful grave that it earned nearly a half century ago. "The Holy City," under the name of "Salome," was throtted by the officers of the law in the East, and deserves to meet the same fate in the West, where people are generally supposed to be even more sensitive in respect to morality and religion, and altogether less morbid in temperament than the residents of the effete East.

Max Figman, who is unquestionably one of the most brilliant and engaging comedians on the American stage and a man of many artistic attainments, will be the attraction at the Eugene theatre on Friday, December 27th, 1907, in the sparkling comedy success, "The Man on the Box," which kept New York smiling for nearly a year and has not since been equalled by any other comedy. Grath's book which was all the vogue for a long time and, like the book, can be seen many times and enjoyed more each time. The stellar role fits Mr. Figman like a glove and his success has been so pronounced that many competent critics declare it stamps him the foremost comedian of the current age. Manager John Cort has surrounded him with a company of more than usual quality and a beautiful stage production.

Manager George H. Smith has completed arrangements with Frank W. Healy for an appearance at the Eugene theatre for one night of the San Francisco Opera Company in "The Toy Maker," a comic opera in two acts and four scenes. The piece has to do with Pohannus Guggenheimer of Nuremberg, an inventor of wonderful toys, and his daughter, Elsie. Plays and players have received the unstinted praise of the critics of Portland, Denver and New York.

"Strongheart," a comedy by William C. DeMille, will be presented here by Ralph Stuart and his company under the direction of Henry B. Harris, on Monday, December 23, at the Eugene theatre.

As the college-bred Indian whose name furnishes the title of the play, Mr. Stuart by a characterization of unusualness and power, seems certain to increase the large measure

of popularity already won by him in his former successes. Mr. DeMille presents the problem of the educated Indian in love with a woman not of his own race. This unconventional story is placed in an equally out of the ordinary setting—Columbia University, with youthful college life, its campus heroes and its football game. Mr. Stuart will be supported by a carefully selected company containing many well-known players.

REPORT OF MONDAY'S COUNCIL MEETING

The committee appointed to report on whether an appeal should be taken from the decision of Judge Harris on the writ of review taken in the case of the city against W. R. Gue and W. C. Gay, made a report in favor of taking the appeal. By motion the city attorney was instructed to perfect appeals in both cases.

The committee to whom the ordinance requiring a license for hotels, bottling works, restaurants, soft drink parlors, drug stores, and other similar places, was referred, reported in favor of the passage of the ordinance. The ordinance requires that such business be required to pay a license tax of \$2 per year for each place. It simply puts these places under the surveillance of the city authorities, and they can see that they are properly conducted and no law violated.

The vote on the ordinance was as follows: Calkins, aye; Garrett, aye; Fisher, no; Henderson, aye; Berger, aye; McCrady, aye.

The ordinance adopting and ratifying Sladden's Third Addition to Eugene was presented again; the plat having been corrected as the council desired, and it was passed by a unanimous vote of the council.
