## COUNTY TAX LEVY FOR 1908 TWELVE MILLS

COURT MAKES IT TWO MILLS LOWER THAN LEVY OF LAST YEAR.

WILL RAISE \$271,481.42 ON AN ASSESSED VALUATION OF \$18,456,785 — REDUCTION FOR COUNTY, STATE AND LIBRARY PURPOSES.

The county court today fixed the tax levy for Lane county at 12 mills, which is two mills less than last year's levy. It is segregated as follows:

State	2.9 mills
County school	3.5 mills
Library	.95 mills
Road	1 mill
County	4.55 mills
Total	12 mills

This will raise the sum of \$271,481.42 on an assessed valuation of \$18,456,785.

## MONTHLY MEETING OF SCHOOL BOARD

BILLS ALLOWED AND COMMITTEE FOR COUNTY HIGH SCHOOL ANNOUNCED

The regular monthly meeting of the Eugene school board was held last evening, but no business of importance was transacted, as only three members were present. A large number of bills were presented and acted upon, and the committee recently appointed by Chairman Osburn to work up the county high school proposition was announced. The committee consists of the following: Judge E. O. Potter, D. E. Yorran, C. H. Fisher, W. G. Gilstrap and Darwin Brelston. A petition will probably be circulated to present to the county court, asking that the matter be presented to the voters at the next election. The law requires that when a petition signed by 100 or more voters is submitted the question shall be submitted to the voters at the next general election or at a special election.

## UP-TO-DATE FISH AND POULTRY MARKET

The Eugene Market is now an assured success, and Manager Huff tells us that on account of the large demand for fish and poultry he has been unable so far to keep enough stock on hand. It has been storming so hard on the coast that the fishermen have been unable to handle their nets. From now on he expects to be able to have all kinds of fish and shell fish at all times. He is shipping in live crabs and cooking them here and opening all his oysters here so the patrons will be assured of fresh goods at all times. Don't forget that you can get either a live or dressed chicken at any time. Chickens will be either dry picked or scalded, as you might prefer.

## ENGINE ON MOHAWK BRANCH TURNS TURTLE

Yesterday evening about 5 o'clock a locomotive on its way to Wendling on the Mohawk branch left the rails from some unknown cause and running along the ties and tearing up the track for a distance of nearly 100 feet it turned turtle. No one was seriously hurt, although Fireman McCullough suffered severe cuts on his right hand. Both the engineer and fireman jumped before the locomotive turned over.

The locomotive, whose number is 2196, was pulling a caboose and was on the way to Wendling after a number of cars of lumber. As it reached a point near Yarnell station something went wrong, with the result as stated.

The Eugene-Wendling local passenger train was at the Wendling end of the line at the time of the wreck, and it was unable to make its run to this city. An extra train was sent up from Albany to transfer the passengers for this city and Springfield. A crew of men was put to work this morning to repair the track and right the engine, but up to a late hour this afternoon the train had not been able to pass the wreck.

## RESERVE FUND DIVIDED AMONG SEVERAL COUNTIES

Salem, Oregon, Jan. 1.—Secretary of State W. F. Benson today made the distribution of the 10 per cent Forest Reserve Fund, which is divided among the several counties in which forest reserves are located, each sharing in the funds according to the number of acres of reserve in each. This fund must be used by the counties for school and road purposes, half of the money being devoted to each purpose. Two apportionments are made at this time, for the reason that information was not available before this upon which to make the 1906 apportionment.
