INSANITY WILL BE DEFENSE OF THAW

New York, Jan. 2.—Counsel for Harry K. Thaw consulted today, and it was reported that it has been definitely decided that the only defense to be made would be insanity at the time Stanford White was killed. It will be contended, however, that Thaw is now sane. Those in conference were Martin A. Littleton, Daniel O'Reilly and A. Russell Peabody.
 The defense, it is said, will offer much new testimony. There will be scores of eye-witnesses to the shooting of White, who have not before, but will testify that in their opinion Thaw was crazed on the night of the murder.

WHY JAPANESE BOUGHT EXPLOSIVES

Washington, Jan. 2.—Councillor Miyako, charge d'affaires of the Japanese embassy, stated today that he had heard nothing of the reported activity of his government in shipping saltpetre and yucca from Chili to Japan for manufacture into explosives, news of which has been brought to San Francisco by passengers arriving. Mr. Miyako has heard of the use of saltpetre importations by private interests from Chili into Japan for agricultural purposes, which he suggests may be the use to which any importations now coming from that country may be put.

PROMINENT CITIZEN OF ASTORIA DROWNED

Astoria, Jan. 2.—The body of Captain James E. Campbell, who for many years has been one of Astoria's most honored and respected citizens, and was well-known in shipping circles along the coast, was picked up in the river at the foot of Tenth street about 6 o'clock this evening.
 The finding of the body was the first intimation that a tragedy had occurred, as Captain Campbell had been seen on the streets early this morning, and he told his friends that he intended taking a trip to Portland. Just how the accident happened is not known, but it is supposed that while walking along the waterfront the deceased was attacked with heart failure and fell overboard.

PREPARING FOR ATTACK BY JAPAN

Despite the assurances of an earnest desire for peace between the United States and Japan, which were given Secretary of War Taft by high officials during his recent journey through the land of the Mikado, the government proceeds with its preparations for defense in case of war, particularly with reference to the Philippines and the Pacific coast. Adjutant-generals of the National Guards of Oregon, Washington and California have been invited by the war department to confer with the officials at Washington, D. C., on the subject of coast defense. General W. E. Finzer leaves Portland for the national capital tomorrow at the same time General J. B. Louck will board a train at San Francisco for the same point, while General Otis Hamilton will start for Washington from Seattle next Saturday.
 The request for a conference was transmitted through General Oliver, the acting secretary of war. Two questions of vast importance to the country will be discussed—training volunteer coast artillery reserves to man the fortifications of Oregon, Washington and California and perfecting the infantry regiments of the three states in coast defense operations. The matter of joint maneuvers this year for the National Guards of these states will also be taken up.—Telegram.

He was examined before Judge Chrisman this morning and committed to the insane asylum at Salem. Drs. T. W. Harris and W. L. Cheshire were the examining physicians. Venturrini is aged 48 years and has an aged mother, wife and several children. He was formerly engaged as track walker for the Southern Pacific Company and had held the job for 18 years. Lately he has been acting very queerly and has threatened to take the lives of his wife and children. He has several times called on the neighbors to take his family away, declaring that they were not his.

Portland, Jan. 3.—In a document comprising 25 typewritten pages, filed in the United States circuit court today, W. C. Bristol, special attorney for the state and solicitor in the American Surety Company, in the insolvency proceedings of the Title Guarantee & Trust Company, willful misappropriation of general fund (funds of the state by official and school funds) is charged. It is alleged that the state's moneys were diverted in flagrant violation of the provisions of the constitution and the codes of Oregon.
