EDITOR OF FRUIT PAPER IN EUGENE

H. Shepard, editor of "Better Fruit" published at Hood River, is in the city in attendance upon the horticultural meeting at the court house this afternoon. He is on the program for an address on "Fruit Raising as a Business."

Mr. Shepard was seen by a Guard after the Commercial Club meeting this morning. In a short interview he took occasion to comment on the city on its fine quarters for the past few years and the progress of its citizens. In his opinion the horticultural conditions in Hood River this year, Mr. Shepard said, are the best and healthiest he has ever seen, but the crop was a little smaller than last year, but the quality was greater this year than before. Many acres of new orchards are being set out every year. He said the strawberry crop was up to standard this year, but not much attention is being paid to growing now as formerly for the reason that it yields greater returns than any other work.

Mr. Shepard formerly traveled for

a wholesale house through this territory and made Eugene quite frequently, but this is his first visit here since 1900. He was much surprised at the growth of the city in seven years.

J. W. HOBBS HURT IN A RUNAWAY

THROWN OUT OF VEHICLE ON HIS WAY TO DUCK LAKES FOR A HUNT

Deputy Internal Revenue Inspector J. W. Hobbs is confined to his home on West Ninth street in this city on account of injuries received yesterday afternoon in a runaway. Mr. Hobbs was on his way to the duck lakes in the Long Tom country where he intended to spend a day or two hunting on the preserves. As he reached the Mitchell place he stopped his team to open a gate, and in getting out of the vehicle the lines were dropped. This frightened the team and it started to run, throwing Mr. Hobbs out, and the rig ran over him. He received a deep cut five or six inches long on the top of his head and several of his ribs were badly bruised. He at once came back to town and Dr. T. W. Harris dressed his wound. It was necessary to take a large number of stitches to close the wound. It was thought that the ribs were broken, but the doctor found only bad bruises.

Mr. Hobbs was in considerable pain today from the injury to his side, and it may be several days before he is able to be out of the house.

The speaker cited many instances of trusted cashiers and others, men who ended their days in prison by reason of their sins, and endeavored to impress his hearers with the thought, "Be sure your sins will find you out. You may cover up your tracks," he said, "you may fool your wife and your church, you may even fool your preacher, but God can't be fooled. It's a curse to cover up sin, and some day your sin will stand revealed before those from you are seeking to hide it. We all have to face our Judge. We are either under law or to be judged by the law, every sin must be atone for, or under grace. Christ alone can forgive the past and keep free from sin in the present and future. Which are you under, law or grace?"

At the call to put life and influence on the side of Christ fully seventy-five unconverted persons rose in the audience and ten persons bowed at the altar and found peace in Christ.

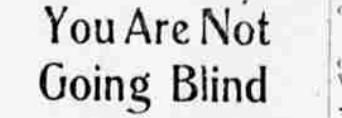

ROSS NOW READY TO ASSIST BANK

President Ross, of the defunct Title bank, offers to turn over his own estate for payment of depositors, now that W. M. Ladd has agreed to guarantee the bank's indebtedness.

The text of Ladd's agreement has been drafted by District Attorney Manning and submitted to Ladd's attorneys.

Mr. Ladd has not reached an agreement with the American Surety Company. His friends deny that he is trying to shun such an agreement.

According to the text of the depositors' agreement, the surety company will get from Ladd the \$100,000 which it has paid the state and the \$295,910 which it has promised to pay the state in two years with five per cent interest, in three years with four per cent interest. The surety company wants better terms.

Attorney W. C. Bristol, representing the surety company and state, yesterday petitioned Judge Wolverton to order Receiver Mears to restore the state school money, \$288,000, dollar for dollar, as a trust fund, "prior to the payment of money to any other individual," and to defer until this matter shall be determined distribution of \$34,000 trust funds, which the receiver has asked the court to authorize.

Judge Wolverton deferred decision in the matter until January 10.—Oregonian.
