

PORTLAND BANK OFFICIALS INDICTED ON FOUR CHARGES

Portland, Jan. 6.—Four separate indictments were filed against each of the following officers of the Title Guarantee & Trust Company by District Attorney Manning this afternoon. Those indicted were President J. Thoburn Ross, Vice President Geo. J. Hill, Secretary John E. Atchison and Treasurer T. T. Burkhardt.

The four indictments are: receiving deposits after the bank was known to be insolvent; conversion to their own use of public money; loaning public money; larceny by neglect to pay over school funds on demand.

PERJURY CHARGE AGAINST DRUCE IS DISMISSED

London, Jan. 6.—The charge of perjury against Herbert Druce, resulting from the mystery of the death of Thomas C. Druce, whose coffin was opened December 30, has been dropped.

ACCUSED OFFICIALS WILL PLEAD GUILTY

San Francisco, Jan. 6.—The Bulletin says that J. Dalzell Brown, formerly vice president and general manager of the wrecked California Safe Deposit & Trust Company, and Walter J. Barnett, formerly director of the same institution, under indictment for embezzlement, will plead guilty and throw themselves upon the mercy of the court.

SUPREME COURT KILLS EMPLOYERS' LIABILITY ACT

Washington, Jan. 6.—In an opinion by Justice White, the supreme court of the United States holds to be unconstitutional the congressional enactment of June 11, 1906, known as the "employers' liability act," making railroads and other common carriers responsible to employes in case of accidents due to the negligence of fellow servants, or to ineffective appliances.

CARS ARE RUNNING REGULAR AT MUNCIE

Muncie, Jan. 6.—There were no disturbances this morning. The cars are running on regular schedule and the streets are patrolled by five hundred business and professional men,

sworn in as deputies. Twelve companies of infantry and one battery of the Indiana National Guard are resting in their quarters.

RIPPER MURDER OCCURS IN BERLIN

Berlin, Jan. 4.—A ripper murder has occurred in the suburb of Charlottenburg. A little girl victim was enticed to a doorway and stabbed in exactly the same manner as that employed last July, when a fiend stalked the city by a series of stabbings of young children. No trace of the murderer can be found.

LARGE CROWD WOULD WITNESS SECOND TRIAL OF HARRY THAW

New York, Jan. 6.—A large crowd gathered about the criminal court building today to catch a glimpse of Harry K. Thaw, as he crossed the

Bridge of Sighs on his way to court for the beginning of his second trial for the murder of Stanford White, and in the corridors several hundred people gathered to witness the opening scenes.

Thaw was elated over the fact that the trial is on. One of his sisters and a brother called upon him with a message from his mother, who is too ill to leave Pittsburg. Thaw's wife went directly from the hotel to the court house.

At the very outset of the trial a plea of insanity was entered in behalf of the defendant.

Charles E. Gremmels, a ship broker, was the first juror in the Thaw case.

Two more jurors were later secured, making three in all.

FORMER OFFICIAL ACCUSED OF GRAFT

HOBOS WHO ROBBED OLD MAN WALKER SENTENCED THIS AFTERNOON BY JUDGE HARRIS

SPECIAL TERM OF CIRCUIT COURT BEGAN THIS MORNING MANY CIVIL CASES BEING DISPOSED OF—TWO CRIMINAL CASES DISMISSED

The special term of circuit court recently called by Judge Harris convened this morning at 9 o'clock.

Criminal Cases Dismissed. The case of the state vs. William Arnold, charged with rape on the person of Emma Toole, was dismissed upon motion of the state, also that of the state vs. Mrs. John Lynch and Clyde Hastings, charged with assault with intent to commit rape upon the person of Eva Lynch.

Criminals Arraigned

H. Armstrong and W. H. Haines, the two youths who stole a couple of horses from Kompff's livery stable at Junction and took them over to Crook county, were arraigned this forenoon. Armstrong entered a plea of guilty and Haynes took his day to plead and will enter his plea tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock.

Robert Dillon, who forged a check and passed it on Roberts Bros., of this city, and John Lewis, M. L. Banks and Charles Sharp, the three negroes arrested out south of Cottage Grove for holding up and robbing David Walker near that city were arraigned. The negroes pleaded guilty, but Dillon will not plead until tomorrow.

Negroes Get Eight Years Each

The three negroes were sentenced this afternoon by Judge Harris to serve eight years each in the state penitentiary.

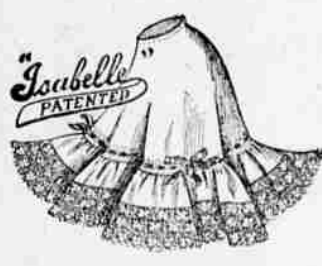

WILLIAMSON WINS APPEAL TO SUPREME COURT

Washington, Jan. 6.—The case against former Congressman Williamson, of Oregon, charged with unlawfully taking up public lands in Crook county, Oregon, in conspiracy with one hundred others, was decided by the supreme court in favor of Williamson. The United States court for Oregon imposed a fine of \$500 and sentenced Williamson to prison for irregularity in admitting affidavits of homesteaders.

HARTJE REFUSED RIGHT TO APPEAL

Philadelphia, Jan. 6.—The Pennsylvania supreme court today refused to permit an appeal to be taken to that tribunal from the superior court in the famous Hartje case. Hartje was refused a divorce from his wife and she took the case to the United States supreme court.

HENEY WANTS FULTON TO SUE LINCOLN STEFFENS

Tucson, Ariz., Jan. 4.—When asked for a statement in reply to an open letter of Senator Fulton, of Oregon, today, Francis J. Heney said: "It is not an easy matter to answer a letter which I have not read and will not attempt to do so. Lincoln Steffens' articles on Oregon land frauds, published in the American magazine, and several articles in Collier's weekly make statements about Senator Fulton which are libelous, if not true, and charge him with acts which would be construed as corrupt. If he denies their truth, I suggest that he test their accuracy by a libel suit."

GRAFTING SUPERIVOR DROPPED DEAD TODAY

San Francisco, Jan. 6.—Former Supervisor Thomas F. Loran drowned today at his home this morning. He was a member of the board of supervisors who confessed to having received bribes from the United Railroads, telephone companies and other corporations.

Denounces Heney As a Liar

I denounced him as a liar and he now writes himself down as one, as he fails and refuses even to attempt to submit any statement of facts."

Taft Favors MORE PAY FOR REGULAR ARMY

Washington, Jan. 6.—Secretary Taft is a strong advocate of increased pay for the army, and his annual report just sent to congress depicts any doubt that may exist as to his disposition. The report shows a rapid increase in the strength of the army, the loss last year having been \$25,000,000, and the pressing need for officers to replace those now detailed on recruiting duty and as military instructors in educational institutions.

JAPAN'S RESERVES ARE NOT BEING CALLED HOME

Washington, Jan. 6.—Mr. Mayoka, in charge of the Japanese embassy here, today authorized a formal denial of the report from Vancouver, B.C., that the Japanese government is recalling to Japan its reserve men now in the United States, and that he had not the least intention of any such purpose on the part of the Japanese government. Moreover, a call to return to Japan of the reserves would necessarily be preceded a considerable time by the mobilization of the reserve now in Japan.
