### COLEMAN HAVING NEW PLANS DRAWN FOR BUILDING

J. B. Coleman, the capitalist, is having another set of plans drawn for his proposed addition of two stories to his row of one-story buildings on Willamette street, mention of which has frequently been made by the Guard during the past few months. Once or twice before he advertised for bids on the structure, but he considered them too high and rejected every one. He has modified the plans somewhat and is having Architect Hunsicker redraw them. He will receive bids in a short time and the figure suits him he will build in the spring. The addition will be built of brick and will have a cement finish. The plans call for a beautiful front, similar to that of the Harvey block. There will not be much brick work to do, only a few feet on the south side and a little in the front or rear, a great deal of both to consist of windows. There will be 63 rooms on the two floors, most of them bedrooms. Mr. Coleman intending to conduct a lodging house. The front rooms on the second floor will be used for offices. A central way will be in the middle of the block.

### MANY CONVENTIONS WILL BE HELD IN CITY OF PORTLAND

(Special Correspondence.)  
Portland, Ore., Jan. 4.—Oregonians will be busy attending conventions to be held in this city during January. The list includes:  
Jan. 13 and 14—The Northwest Retail Harness & Saddlery Manufacturers' Association.  
January 14, 15 and 16—Oregon Horticultural Society.  
Jan. 17 and 18—Oregon State Press Association.  
Jan. 21 and 22—Retail Grocers' Association.  
Jan. 21 and 22—Oregon Retail Hardware and Implement Dealers' Association.  
Jan. 23, 24, and 25—Pacific Federation of Implement and Hardware Dealers.

A big excursion from the "Inland Empire," through Oregon and California, under the special auspices of the Spokane Chamber of Commerce and the Walla Walla Commercial Club, will spend all day Saturday, February 8, in Portland, where they will be given a ride over the city, luncheon and dinner and reception by a special committee of the Portland Commercial Club. Their itinerary also calls for brief stops at Roseburg and Medford. The chief purpose of this excursion is to interest the thousands of tourists now gathered in Southern California so that they may return to their Eastern homes by way of the Pacific Northwest.

The colonist rates, which resulted in bringing such a vast immigration to Oregon during September and October, 1907, will be in effect for March and April of 1908. The rate applies on all railroads, to all rail points in Oregon, on the same basis as before. \$25 from Kansas City, Minneapolis and Duluth; \$30 from St. Louis; \$33 from Chicago; \$50 from New York. The fare is \$2.50 less on each ticket sold to a point east of Umatilla. An effort will be made by all the commercial bodies throughout the state of Oregon, to make these two months add 20,000 to the population of the state.

No convention ever held in Oregon has received the liberal national notice accorded to the recent meeting of the Oregon State Dairy Association. Pages have been devoted to it in the agricultural and dairy journals of the country, at a season when the Eastern dairymen are most strongly impressed with the climatic advantages of the state.
