THREE MORE CRIMINALS GIVEN PRISON SENTENCES

DILLON, FORGER OF CHECKS, GETS THREE YEARS IN THE PENITENTIARY

ARMSTRONG AND HAINES, THE HORSE THIEVES, GIVEN INDETERMINATE SENTENCE OF FROM ONE TO TEN YEARS—COURT WILL SOON ADJOURN

Judge Harris of the circuit court this afternoon sentenced Robert Dillon, the man who forged the name of an Albany man to a check and passed it on Roberts' boys' trolley in this city, to three years in the state penitentiary, he having pleaded guilty.

H. Armstrong and W. Haines, the youths who hired two horses from the Kompp livery stable at Junction City, and ran away with them to Crook county, also pleaded guilty and were given an indeterminate sentence of from one to ten years in the penitentiary. If their behavior is the best they will serve the minimum time.

After the road case was called and the jury selected it was found that no other case would come up that would require a jury and those not on this case were discharged for the term.

MONUMENT UNVEILED IN MEMORY OF BENNINGTON

plauding populace. Yet as they look down upon this scene today from the heights of the benighted, they must rejoice in the consciousness that they failed not to give to their country, when she asked it, the utmost they had to give, dying as brave men and true would wish to die, in the performance of duty.

Unveiling ceremony. When Admiral Goodrich had concluded his address the unveiling took place, consisting of the dropping of the national ensign which had been draped over the two tablets of stone on the face of the monument. One was inscribed:

"To the Bennington dead," and the other:

"Erected by the officers and men of the Pacific squadron, to the memory of those who lost their lives in the performance of duty."

As the flags dropped the soldiers presented arms and three ruffles and flourishes on the drums started the minute guns on board the Charleston and Chicago, which were fired regularly through the remainder of the service.

The second address was given by Colonel R. V. Dodge, president of the Bennington Memorial Association, and after the reading of the benediction by Bishop Johnson, the graves were decorated with flowers by children from Point Loma Home-stead.

ALBANY CONSIDERS WATERS OWNERSHIP

Albany, Or., Jan. 6.—Two of the largest public service corporations within Linn county are delinquent in taxes to a total of \$6388.46.

The Willamette Valley Company, holding an exclusive franchise for furnishing lights and water to Albany, has been delinquent since April and the county is preparing to advertise and sell its real property for the taxes, \$2664.88, plus penalty and interest, a total of \$3197.86. The penalty alone amounts to \$532.98.

The Corvallis & Eastern Railroad Company, now owned and controlled by the Harriman interests, delinquent in the sum of \$2658.93. Penalty and interest make the total \$3290.69.

The delinquency of the Willamette Valley Company has resulted in the agitation of municipal ownership and the building of a pipe line from some mountain stream into the city.

DID NOT OPEN BIDS FOR CITY WATER BONDS

Last night at 7:30 o'clock was the time set by the city council for the opening of bids for the \$300,000 water bonds recently voted by the people of Eugene, but the matter of opening and examining them was postponed until a future time awaiting the decision in the case at Portland wherein Judge Cleland, of the circuit court, declared the bond election there to be illegal. As the Eugene election seems to have been the same as the one at Portland, the city officials thought it best to await a final decision on the matter or until after the election next April, when the question will be voted upon again and in a manner that will leave no doubt as to the legality of the election.

City Recorder Dorris stated to a reporter today that there are a number of bids for the bonds, most of the offered by local capitalists.
