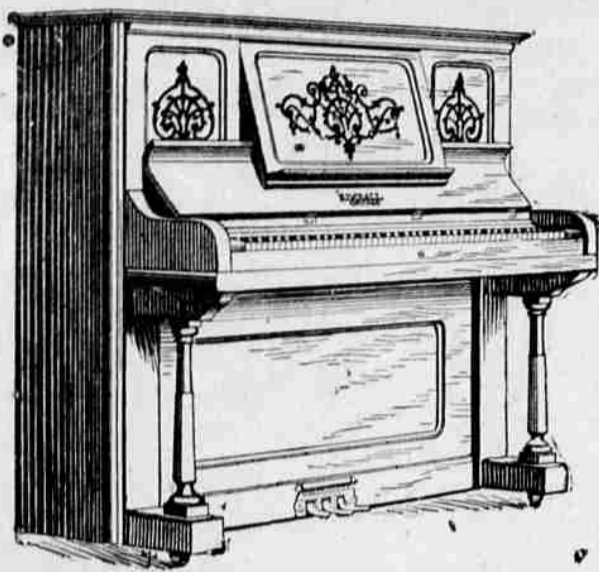

## BIRTHS EXCEED DEATHS IN DECEMBER

THIRTY-ONE CHILDREN BORN, 23 PERSONS DIED DURING MONTH IN LANE COUNTY.

Dr. J. W. Harris, county health officer, has prepared his report for the month of December, 1907, and from it the following statistics are obtained:

Number of births, 31; girls 11 and boys 20.

Number of deaths, 23, from the following causes:

Heart disease, 3; diabetes, 2; tuberculosis, 5; gastro-enteritis, 1; cerebro spinal meningitis, 1; accidental, 2; paralysis, 1; Graves disease, 1; failure in establishing condition, 1; acute nephritis, 1; softening of brain, 1; whooping cough, 1; scarlet fever, 1; apoplexy, 1; no cause assigned, 1.
