# WINNIFRED KELLY MYSTERIOUSLY DISAPPEARS

## HER RELATIVES AND FRIENDS FEAR THAT SHE HAS BEEN FOULLY DEALT WITH

### SYSTEMATIC SEARCH OF THE CITY BEING MADE THIS AFTERNOON BY STUDENTS OF UNIVERSITY—LAST SEEN AT 6:10 O'CLOCK LAST EVENING

Miss Winnifred Kelly, daughter of Mrs. Mattie Kelly, who resides at 788 Willamette street, and of Abe Kelly, also of this city, disappeared last evening and has not been seen since by her relatives or friends, who are much concerned over her disappearance.

Miss Kelly was last seen at the residence of her uncle, John F. Kelly, at the corner of West Sixth and Lincoln streets. She left her home late yesterday afternoon, stating that she was going to Schwarzschild's book store to buy a German book for use in her studies at the University. She was at the home of her friend, Miss Kate Henderson, and at the home of Miss Minnie Hawthorne during the evening, and from there went to John Kelly's residence. The family asked her to stay for dinner, but she declined, stating that she had been invited out to one of the sorority houses. She left the Kelly residence at 6:10 o'clock, and that was the last seen of her.

When Miss Kelly failed to return home at the usual hour, her mother and sister, Miss Frances, became alarmed and began to make inquiry as to her whereabouts. All her relatives and numerous friends in town were telephoned to, and when it was learned that she had said she was invited to one of the sororities all of the girls club houses were telephoned to, but she had not been to any of them during the evening. The officers were then notified and a diligent search was made for the missing girl. Several theories were advanced, among them being that she might have been waylaid on a dark street by hobos or desperate characters, and drugged and kidnapped, and another that she might have boarded the northbound flyer, which arrived but a few minutes after she left John Kelly's residence. If the latter is true, why she should want to run away is a mystery. Her mother and sister say there was no trouble at home, and she seemed to be happy at all times. She was not keeping steady company with any young man, and it does not seem likely that she eloped with any one, although it is said her folks think it possible she might have left to marry a former student of the University who is now attending a medical college in Chicago. However, as the girl is of age, being 19 years old, it is not thought probable that she would have occasion to keep the marriage a secret from her folks and friends. A young man at the University had Miss Kelly's company engaged for the show at the theatre last night, but early in the afternoon she telephoned him that she would be unable to go. This, together with the fact that she told that she had been invited to one of the sorority houses, when it was proven that she had not been, lends color to the theory that she planned to leave on the train. Inquiry of the ticket agent on duty at the depot at the time the train arrived proved that she had bought no ticket, but the officers are endeavoring to communicate with the conductor, who is in Portland today, to learn whether or not she boarded the train.

### Students Searching

The classes at the University were dismissed this afternoon and the students are making a systematic search of the city for the missing girl on the belief that she might have been foully dealt with and that she might be found in some lodging house or out-of-the-way place.

Miss Kelly has always borne the best reputation, and always kept the best of company. On that account the mystery is all the deeper. She is a beautiful girl, vivacious and full of life, and is a member of the sophomore class at the University, having many friends among the students, as well as outside the institution, having lived here a greater part of her life. At the time of her disappearance she wore a black tail-coat made suit, a white hat with blue plumes and a black veil with big dots.

The whole city is stirred up over her disappearance, and her distracted mother and sister have the sympathy of all.

Miss Kelly is the niece of John P. and George H. Kelly, of the Booth-Kelly Lumber Company, and a granddaughter of President Cheevers, the Kellys and Cheevers being among the best and foremost families of the county.

Later this afternoon it was learned that a man saw a girl answering to the description of Miss Kelly walking along the road between Eugene and Springfield last night about 7 o'clock. A number of the students started out toward Springfield to see if anything further could be learned.

### CITY WINS ROAD TAX CASE IN THE SUPREME COURT

The case of the city of Eugene, respondent, vs. Lane county, appellant, appeal from the circuit court of Lane county, has been decided by the supreme court at Salem, in favor of the city. Judge Hamilton's decision is being affirmed. This is a case wherein the city sued the county for over \$5200 road tax money, and won the case in the circuit court, but the county took it to the supreme court. The city will be ahead that amount, L. E. Bean and J. M. Williams were attorneys for the city and Woodcock & Potter for the county.

### DATES ANNOUNCED FOR INSPECTION

Orders were issued from National Guard headquarters yesterday forenoon assigning dates for the annual inspection of various organizations by the regular army. The inspection will begin next Tuesday night. Colonel James Jackson, U. S. A., retired, will act as inspecting officer.

The order has caused unusual activity among Guardsmen, for the inspection will be strict and thorough. Any organization not measuring up to the regular army standard in the matter of organization, attendance and condition of equipment will be liable to disbandment. Every infantry company is required to have an enrollment of 58 men.

That the Guard will pass the regular army inspection little doubt is entertained. Reorganization upon an army basis has been effected throughout since the strongest order from the war department several weeks ago. The Fourth Oregon Infantry, stationed in Southern Oregon, has been segregated into separate companies and other minor changes have been made to meet the requirements. General failure to pass annual inspection would result in forfeiture of the federal appropriation, amounting to \$15,000 a year.
