WINIFRED KELLY FOUND AND IS HOME AGAIN

WENT TO ALBANY AND REGISTERED AT HOTEL UNDER HER OWN NAME

LEFT HOME THROUGH FEAR OF SCOLDING FROM HER MOTHER FOR SOME TRIVIAL OFFENSE—BROUGHT BACK HOME BY HER UNCLE TODAY

Miss Winifred Kelly, who disappeared from her home in this city on Tuesday evening, was found at Albany last night and she arrived home on this afternoon's train with her uncle, William Cheshire of Springfield, who went down on this morning's train after her.

Sheriff Plak, after attempting to reach by telephone the conductor of the north bound flyer which passed through Eugene Tuesday evening, succeeded late in the afternoon and learned from him that a girl tallying exactly with the description given by Miss Kelly boarded the train here and got off at Albany. The sheriff of Linn county was then asked to look out for her and he located her at the Russ Hotel between 8 and 9 o'clock last evening. She registered at the hotel shortly after the train arrived under her own name. The only explanation given by Miss Kelly's action is that on the impulse of the moment she concluded to run away from home on account of fear of chastisement from her mother because of a trivial breach of family discipline. She is of a very sensitive nature, impulsive to the extreme, and no doubt took this means of avoiding a scolding.

The family is again reunited and happy, and the little incident will soon be forgotten.

Said She Was Visiting.
An Albany dispatch in today's Oregonian says:

"Sheriff S. D. Smith received word from Eugene to be on the watch for Miss Kelly, as it was thought she might have taken a train from Eugene for this city last night. On looking over the hotel register he was surprised to see her name, and immediately notified F. J. Miller, who is a connection of hers.

Mr. Miller, who is a brother of Consul General Miller, of Shanghai, went at once to the hotel with his sister. For a long time there was no response to their requests to be allowed to enter the room where she was, but finally Miss Miller alone was allowed to go in.

To her Miss Kelly said she had come away from home simply to visit friends at Albany. Inasmuch as she carried no luggage, and had no more than enough money to pay her hotel bill, this statement looked a little strange to the Millers. However, she said that she was going back in the morning. She was finally persuaded to accompany Mr. Miller and his sister home for the night, and will take the morning train for Eugene.

Miss Kelly refused to make any explanation of her sudden trip, other than that she had "come to visit friends." She would have nothing to say as to her motive, and when asked if she had had a quarrel with a young man she maintained a strict silence.

It is thought that one of two reasons actuated the girl to run away from home—either she had had a quarrel with some young man, or there had been some trouble at home.

PORTLAND MARKET REPORT.
Portland, Or., Jan. 8.
Wheat buyers report a material improvement in trade since the opening of the year and a firm tone prevails in the market at this time. Considerable buying is being done and the volume of the trade is steadily growing. Prices today underwent no change locally. Barley and oats are steady. The quotations that have ruled for a week or more, and but little of these grains is being moved.
Onion Market Ranging Higher.
On account of a sharp improvement in demand at fractionally high-

er prices 1 1/2 per 100 pounds was added to the local price of onions at country points today by shippers. At shipping stations buyers today are offering as high as \$1.85 for first class stock. Sales are fair but some growers are again showing a tendency to hold because of the increased rail. In the Front Street market the price today for first-class stock ranges from \$2.25 with second-class onions close to \$2. Local shippers are sending out warblings to their country friends not to get excited because the market is slightly up and hold their stock. Buyers claim that the market has every prospect of making another fractional rise but prices will not go so very high because onions will be brought in from the East if Pacific coast figures warrant it.

Potatoes in a Rut.
The potato market is far from pleasing, either to the shipper or to the producer. Present buying prices at country points range around 50c and 55c per 100 pounds for first-class shipping stock. It is stated that many consignments to the south have recently been made by Eastern Multnomah producers but their returns have been no more satisfactory than the present market.

Cheap Butter Quite Plentiful.
The cheaper grades of butter continue too plentiful for the demand and the result is that most sales of first class products are now being made at 5c. Supplies of outside creamery are increasing and even city creameries report a greater volume of cream shipments than formerly. It is stated that supplies of cold storage butter were never so great in the east nor on the coast than at present.

Poultry Supplies Are Inadequate.
Supplies of poultry continue inadequate to fill the requirements of the trade and the result is that the prices are being held up to the top notch.

Eggs are holding their own quite well with some reporting a slight shortage, and others a glut. Price unchanged at 22 1-2.

Dressed hogs are high with prices firm around 8c for the best. Fresh halibut is almost out of market and the old stocks are being readily sold at quotations. Trade believes when fresh stock arrives that higher prices will rule. Present value at 8c.

Quoting Sweet Potatoes Higher.
Repacked sweet potatoes are selling at an advance of 25c in the local market.

Orange market is quite firm at former range. Supplies just about equal demand.

Demand for cheap quality apples is increasing and the range of value is quite wide.

Celery market is firmer here as a result of the better tone in the south. There remains a very liberal demand for hops in all three of the coast states. The movement in California is not so large as in Oregon because the growers there are holding back somewhat. There is a disposition among the buyers here to take all the hops offered by producers but only low figures are being obtained. Some of the dealers who are not short are now buying for speculation; this being one of the best features of the tired market at present.

A firm tone prevails in all lines in the local livestock market, with no change from the quotations of yesterday.

STIFF PENALTY IMPOSED ON CHAS. MAYHEW.

The jury in the case of the city vs. Chas. Mayhew, charged with maintaining a nuisance at his place because of the sale of liquor, returned a sealed verdict last evening, and at 9 o'clock this morning Police Judge Dorris opened it and found that the defendant had been found guilty. He postponed sentence until 2 o'clock this afternoon, and at that hour called the court to order and imposed a fine of \$200 and a jail sentence of 60 days. This was a surprise to all concerned, even to City Attorney Allen, who conducted the prosecution, as none expected such a heavy sentence. The case will in all probability be taken to the circuit court on a writ of review.
