SECRETARY TAFT STATES POSITION UPON INJUNCTION

Martins Ferry, O., Jan. 9.—The views of Secretary Taft in regard to the abuse of the injunction are set forth in a letter replying to questions propounded by Secretary Lewis of the Ohio Federation of Labor to the Secretary. Taft prefaces his statement with a declaration that he believes it to be a "highly beneficial and entirely lawful for laborers to unite in their common interests."

In brief Taft says he sees no objection to the enactment of a statute which defines the rights of laborers in controversies with their former employers. This would necessarily furnish a definite rule for determining when injunctions should issue as well as their character and scope.

Second, as to whether the Secretary should issue until after a hearing has been given the defendant and a hearing had. Taft says that he has stated many times in public that the power to issue injunctions ex parte has given rise to certain abuses and injuries to laborers engaged in a peaceful strike, in that without a hearing their strike is weakened, although their purpose may have been entirely lawful, by an order which they never had the opportunity to question and which is related to discourage their action. Taft says he favors a federal statute requiring notice and hearing before the injunction issue.

Third, as to whether the courts should retain the power of issuing ex parte injunctions. Taft thinks it is eminently proper that the statute should require the court issuing the injunction, to give the defendant a short period, say three or four days, in which to have a hearing thereon before the injunction issue.

Fourth, Taft says, regarding the punishment of persons in contempt of court for violating injunctions, that the belief that the judge whose order is violated makes a personal matter of it, is, in most cases, unfounded. He does believe, however, that where it can be done without injuring the authority of court, it would be well, in order to avoid even the appearance of injustice, to have the question of contempt decided by another judge than the one issuing the injunction.

JAN KUBELIK APPRECIATED BY EUGENE MUSICIANS

Jan Kubelik, the violinist, played last night before a fair-sized and appreciative audience at the Eugene Theatre. Those of the audience sufficiently well-educated in music assert that his playing was perfect in every respect, and that he deserves the reputation he has won as the greatest living violinist. The appreciation of the audience was shown by its repeated recalls of the musician, who was compelled to appear many times and bow his thanks. His bow was not nearly as good as his playing, but it seemed to please the audience. That the Eugene people know and appreciate high-class music was shown by the fact that only two or three times was the hand-clapping started before the distinguished artist had finished his number. A good many persons were aware, also, when the last number on the program was played and started to leave the house promptly, while most of the others explained that they were only waiting for Kubelik to come before the curtain and render another of his exquisite bows.

Miss Berthe Roy, the talented pianist, met with an unfortunate accident during Kubelik's first number by falling down the stage stairs and spraining her ankle. This happened behind the scenes and the audience missed it, and also were denied the pleasure of hearing Miss Roy play her numbers.

Last night at the Eugene theatre there was a veritable battle between the artistic and the business world. The audience sat and looked at the business bulletin board which the mercenary spirit of the age calls a drop curtain. When that curtain was lighted we were confronted by a large card standing against the piano announcing the fact of its having been loaned by one of our local music houses. The background was the in-artistic parlor scene, with the wonderful frieze of red mountains. Then came Kubelik.

In appearance he is a typical artist, small, delicate, with a very refined face, and yes—he wears long hair. But why quarrel any longer about the artist or football man with long, long locks, or the business man that shaves his pate and persists in rolling up his pantaloons whether it is raining or not. Custom and fashion are ever changing their standards, and it matters little whether we follow them.

Kubelik's manner is quiet, and his face unusually calm, confident and restful to look on. Never does he give the impression of being fatigued.

There is something supremely satisfying in the long, sure sweep of the bow across the strings. Never is there the slightest suggestion of failure, whether in the grand adagio, the delicate, dainty staccato, the clear, singing legato, the jubilant pizzicato, or the many voices of the marvelous arrangement of the famous "Lucia sextette."

Some think Kubelik lacks in what is called both magnetism and soul,

but listening to the wonderful forte passages, the finely graduated swells, and diminuendos, the mystical, unearthly whispers of the pianissimo, there is surely not much more to be desired in the way of expression. We must always listen to, and encourage amateur work; but a master like Kubelik is taken as a part of every life, whether or not the individual has been educated in art; and all alike listen and wonder and work.
