## RED LETTER DAY AT THE M. E. CHURCH

As predicted, Sunday did indeed turn out to be a red letter day for the Methodist church. Great crowds greeted the evangelist at all three services. At night crowds were turned away. During the day fifty persons bowed at the chance seeking Christ among them (fifty men (adults)). Conviction was intense throughout the entire day and many more signified a desire to lead a Christian life.

In the morning service the doors of the church were opened and twenty-three persons availed themselves of the opportunity of joining the church.  
The music throughout the day was inspiring, the congregation sung, led by the great chorus, orchestra and pipe organ, with great enthusiasm. The special numbers by the chorus and the solos were greatly appreciated by every one. That fifty persons (men) to each other's wives, many of them never having sung in a chorus before, should sing with such unity, precision and expression after only two rehearsals is marvelous and reflects great credit on the skill of the evangelist director.

The morning sermon on "True Courage" was a masterly argument on the manliness of doing the right thing. "It takes a live fish to swim against the tide; a dead fish can go with it." True courage consists of doing the right, even if you have to stand alone in doing it.  
The afternoon sermon on the "Presence of Christ" was founded on the incident of Christ's going up to Jerusalem when 12 years of age. "But they, supposing him to have been in the company, went a day's journey and then found he was not

with them." Many people will wake up with dismay some day to find that Christ is not with them, though they have been "supposing Him to be in their company." We must know that he is with us. With great directness Haudenschild argued the necessity of a positive religious experience.  
The evening sermon was on "God's Last Call to Man"—"Prepare to Meet Thy God." He argued that since time is only for a moment and eternity is forever, that the business of our short stay on this planet should be preparation for the next world. He took it up under four heads, prepare to meet thy God, because:

1. Every one is going to meet Him Sometime. We must all stand before the judgment seat of Christ.
  2. It is the manly, courageous thing to do. "A man is a being whose ambition is to do what he knows to be right."
  3. Of your influence. You must not only meet God and account for your own actions, but will be held responsible for the actions of others due to your influence.
  4. Of what Christ has done for you. Recognizing the great sacrifice He has made for you you are base ingrates if you are ashamed of Him.
- This series of meetings closes on Sunday next. It is seldom that an evangelist of the rank of Haudenschild comes to a town of this size, just seven days more in which to hear him, afterward and evening. No Christian in town should miss one of the afternoon meetings. You'll be sorry when he's gone if you allow trivial things to keep you away. Our eyes will behold great things this week in the salvation of great numbers of persons.
