NEW REPORT ON OLIVE STREET EXTENSION

J. G. Wells, A. C. Guthrie and M. D. Mitchell, the new committee appointed by Mayor Matlock to assess the damages and benefits to accrue through the opening of Olive street from a point about a half a block south of West Twelfth street to West Seventeenth street, filed their report with the city council at the meeting last night. The report was laid on the table until next Monday evening, at which time it will be considered for rejection or confirmation. All property owners affected by the opening of the street are requested to appear at that time if they have any objections to the assessment as made by the committee.

The committee assessed damages and benefits as follows:

The expenses of the committee amounted to \$109.

The report of this committee differs materially from that of the old committee in that the assessments in some instances are much lower than those made by the former committee and in a few instances they are higher.

WOOLWINE BOUND OVER TO COURT

Clyde Woolwine, a young man aged about 20 years, was arrested last evening about 5 o'clock by Constable Plank, on a statutory charge preferred by Mrs. E. Gerschack, mother of Hattie Chapman, the 15-year-old girl who attempted suicide the other day. A few days ago the girl, who has been turned over to the juvenile court, told the reason for her attempt at self-destruction. She said that Woolwine had ruined her and she thought that he had left town to get rid of her. Woolwine's arrest followed and he was taken before Judge Bryson, of the justice court, last evening. He waived examination and was bound over to the circuit court in the sum of \$500. He is yet unable to furnish the bond. J. M. Pipes is his attorney.
