## "PADDY" BULL TERRIER LOST HIS TAIL

ATTEMPTS TO GET KINKS OUT RESULTS DISASTROUSLY TO MRS. SCHUECKER'S CANINE

Because "Paddy," the valuable Boston bull terrier belonging to Mrs. Stephanie Bailey Schuecker, a member of the faculty of the University of Oregon School of Music and a daughter of R. S. Bailey, millionaire horseman, of Washington state, had a curly tail not pleasing to its owner's eyes, an attempt to straighten out the "kink" in the canine's caudal appendage has resulted in the loss of the tail entirely. A short time ago Mrs. Bailey consulted a local veterinarian to ascertain if it were possible to straighten "Paddy's" tail, and after some discussion it was decided to put it in a plaster of paris cast in the hope that the curl would disappear. This was done.

For more than a month "Paddy" endured the inconvenience of the plaster cast. At the end of the time set by the physician for the tail to become straight the cast was removed but with it the tail came also. It was then found that the cast had been put on so firmly that the circulation had been stopped with fatal results to the tail.

"Paddy" now is "lobbed," but seems no less happy than when his tail was long and curly.—Correspondence in Portland Telegram.

## HAUDENSCHILD SPOKE ON THE SIN UNPARDONABLE

With powerful directness Evangelist Haudenschild preaches the undiluted gospel—with no clap trap, sensationalism, emotionalism or levity unseemly in a minister of the gospel.

The Methodists are fulfilling their pledge to the public of being in the campaign for the salvation of souls, and the good of the town, church preference being left entirely to the individual seelers.

The sermon last night was mighty in power and appealed from first to last to the reason, not the emotions, of the people who crowded the house. The subject was "The Unpardonable Sin, What It is and Who Are Committing It." The text was "And whosoever speaketh a word against the Holy Spirit it shall not be forgiven him, neither in this world nor in the world to come."

The speaker said that he believed in truth of the text and in the necessity for God to utter such a law that man might not presume to spend his life in sin and then slip into the kingdom of God at the last moment. He made his hearers to understand distinctly that the text enforced all of God's teachings to draw men to immediate repentance, pressing the thought that at any time the sinner rejects the voice of the Holy Spirit that spirit may depart never to return, and that at last he may fall into a condition where he will have no further desire for a life with Christ, the spirit having forsaken him because of his own words of denial spoken to his holy teacher. The preacher brought those who hope to be like the thief on the cross to the stern realization that the experience for any man or woman in hearing could not be repeated, as that man had not before known of Christ, whose ignorance could not urge in excuse for those who reject Him here. He declared to the people who think that the Bible teaches that they may have a chance to repent and be saved at the last moment—that there is not one word in the book that gives any hope for tomorrow, faith whose teaching is "today is the time."

He remarked that many people thought murder to be the greatest sin of all. Then compare the man who would with vile hands kill outright the body of his victim to the one who with sneers at the teaching of God's word, would destroy the faith in Jesus of any believer and so murder the everlasting soul. He declared that he would rather come up before the judgment bar of God with hands stained with the innocent blood of Jesus than to stand before God with the soul stained with the awful crime of murdering the cause for which Christ died and which was dearer to Him than life.

The preacher earnestly urged upon the people that murder, not theft or drunkenness, but rejecting Jesus Christ by turning away from the Holy Spirit, placed man, not in a condition where God refuses pardon, but where he himself refuses to be pardoned. He said that invitation, "Come unto me all ye that labor and are heavy laden" and "he that cometh unto me, I will in no wise cast out," could not follow to the end of life the soul that said "No, no, no," to the voice of God, for the person doing this must cross the unseen line where it refuses to come, refuses to hear. He closed with a thrilling appeal to the un saved to come to the Spirit before their hearts hardened into rebellion against the voice of the Spirit.

Many persons of middle life responded to the call.

His sermon tonight is the counterpart, the sequel, of last night's, "One Word." There will also be special music by the University male quartet and the large chorus. Come early, by 7:15 if you want to be sure of a seat, as the church is crowded every night.

## PLAN TO GRAFT ON OLD FRUIT TREES

Corvallis, Or., Jan. 12.—A movement is being launched here for a great campaign for the re-plantation of old orchards in the Willamette Valley and other parts of Oregon. President Newell of the State Board of Horticulture, Mr. Lowndes, Mr. Reid, and a large number of the fruit inspectors of the various counties are on the ground and are identifying with the plan. The first gain in the campaign was filed by M. O. Lowndes in an address before the visiting horticulturists and other winter short course students in the college chapel yesterday afternoon. The address met with a hearty endorsement and aroused much enthusiasm. The Agricultural College authorities will join in the plan, and in an educational way and otherwise co-operate fully to the utmost extent in furthering the movement.

A new incentive is to be offered farmers for renovating orchards. It has been sought in the past to make the old orchards more profitable. Some good has been accomplished, but hundreds of orchards have remained untouched, with trees unpruned, un-sprayed and covered with scale and other diseases. It is not proposed to abandon the application of various laws, but to it is to be added an appeal to the farmers to renovate their orchards from the standpoint of profit to be derived.

## New Orchards From Old

It is said that within three to five years a complete new orchard can be made out of the old one, and a profit of \$3 to \$10 per tree be realized. This was the assertion of Mr. Lowndes in his address. He says he has accomplished this result with old trees on his farm, and that it can be done by any farmer who can graft or have it done. He says

that the curative process by spraying is not possible always of effectiveness. Some trees are too high for spray to reach them. An essential in this treatment is an effective application of remedies. Men who do spraying for hire are not always particular in the application. Some farmers have one application of spray and think that ought to suffice. The consequence is that the treatment is inadequate, and results unsatisfactory.

The thing to do, says Mr. Lowndes, is to cut down the old trees. The best plan is to cut them close to the ground leaving the roots intact. This should be done by the 1st of March. The next season, from the 10th to the 15th of May, such varieties as are best for the climate and for commercial purposes should be grafted on the three or four best sprouts. Two feet of the graft may be left and the graft be applied to it the first year, and a year of time in reproducing the orchard, if gained, but this requires an expert in grafting, in order to be successful. By either plan the trees will be in good bearing in from three to five years, and a revenue of \$5 to \$10 each will be realized.

In the place of the old, unsightly orchard, there is a new and beautiful one. Instead of the many seasonal varieties, there are new commercial varieties that bring good prices in market. The Willamette Valley Fruit Association indorses the plan completely, and will bring its full influence to bear in pushing the movement.

## SENATOR BOOTH IN EXCITING COYOTE CHASE

One of the most exciting coyote chases that ever occurred in Douglas county was reported to the Review today by Ed Singleton, of Wilbur. The principals in the chase were Mr. Singleton and Hon. R. A. Booth, of Eugene, a pack of hounds that thoroughly understood their business, and as large a coyote as ever devoured a sheep. The varmint was "jumped" Monday afternoon at Edenhower. Hotly pursued by the hounds—and men—Mr. Coyote raced down through the Curry place and then swam the South Umpqua river. Without stopping to shake the water from his shaggy coat the coyote kept on running, running until he came to the barn on Jeff Williams' place at Looking Glass, 13 miles from Edenhower, where he turned at bay against the yelling hounds that had kept relentlessly upon his track, leaving Mr. Booth and Mr. Singleton at the river. Exhausted by his long run the battle was brief, and the varmint soon succumbed to the attack of the dogs.—Roseburg Review.
