WASHINGTON MILLS DECIDE TO OPEN

Centralia, Wash., Jan. 12.—That the mills of the Lewis country will be running full blast by February, is now an assured fact. At a meeting of the lumber manufacturers held in this city this week this matter was thoroughly discussed.

The big plant of the Eastern Railway & Lumber Company has been running on short hours most of the time since the general shut-down a couple of months ago. The Martin Lumber Company resumed operations this morning, both at the mill and in the woods. The Saylor Valley mill will also start up in the near future. The mine and logging camp of the Lincoln Creek Lumber Company will start on full time next Monday.

Nearly all the mills and logging camps on the South Bend branch have already resumed work, and the others will begin within the next ten days. Practically all of the shingle mills in the county started up the beginning of the year.

The big mill and cross-arm factory of the McCormick Lumber Company, together with their logging camps, began working yesterday morning and, as they employ a large number of men, this will be welcome news to the residents along the South Bend branch. The plant of the Doty Lumber Company at Doty will also be in operation within a few days. The resuming of operations by these and many other companies will give employment to a large number of men.

SHERIFF'S SALE ON EXECUTION

Pursuant to an execution issued out of the circuit court of the state of Oregon in and for Lane County, to the undersigned as sheriff of said county, upon a judgment in lien foreclosure entered in said court April 11, 1907, and docketed therein May 15, 1907, a memorial of which judgment was duly entered by the registrar of titles of said county upon the registry of the title of the land hereinafter mentioned, in an action wherein Edward A. Kernutt was plaintiff and Adelbert C. Miller, Clara O. Miller, Charles Rivett, State Land Board and others were defendants, directing a sale of the house and land hereinafter described to satisfy a judgment as entered in said action amounting in the aggregate to \$339.09 and the further sum of \$22.14 costs with interest thereon, since April 11th, 1907, and accruing costs and costs of sale, I, the undersigned as such sheriff, will on the 3rd day of February, 1908, at 10 o'clock a. m., at the westerly front door of the court house in the city of Eugene, sell at public auction to the highest bidder as provided by law, the two-story frame farm house and land on which the same stands and adjoined to be leuable therewith, and all the right, title and interest that defendants Adelbert C. Miller, Clara O. Miller and State Land Board have or had therein, said land being described in said judgment as follows: commencing at a point which is 60 feet west of a line extending north and south through the most westerly part of said farm house and which said point is 60 feet north of a line extended east and west through the most northerly part of said house, running thence south from said point 150 feet, thence east to county road No. 209, thence northerly along the west line of said county road to a point due east of the place of beginning, thence west to place of beginning, all in Lane county, Oregon, said farm house being situated on the southeast corner or part of the following described land, to-wit:
